# WASHINGTON STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY Biennium 2023-2025 Backlog Reduction Plan

WSHS owns and maintains two facilities: In Tacoma, there is the Washington State History Museum (built 1995), the only museum in Washington responsible for collecting and interpreting the history of the entire state, and the Research Center (built in 1911 with additions in 1923 and 1972), housing the artifact and archival collections and providing a reading room for researchers.

WSHS has traditionally used operating funds for routine maintenance of these facilities. Work has been performed by a combination of in-house staff and repair contracts. WSHS uses capital funds for building preservation and improvement projects such as building systems replacement on the manufacturer's recommended cycles. WSHS spends approximately \$1,625,000 per biennium of operating funds for maintenance and upkeep of facilities.

Prior to biennium 2007-2009 WSHS did not have a maintenance backlog. The Washington State History Museum was still relatively new and was built to high construction standards. The Research Center had been keeping current on facilities projects through a combination of routine maintenance paid for with operating funds and capital preservation projects paid for by capital appropriations. Since biennium 2007-2009, WSHS has not been able to stay current with needed preservation projects due to capital budget appropriations being made at amounts which are greatly below WSHS's biennial facilities needs and maintenance staffing levels were well below what's required to keep up on increasing maintenance as the Museum ages.

WSHS has changed its approach to backlog reduction in response to perpetual underfunding of capital budget requests.

Decision Packages in the last Biennium were funded to add to our maintenance staff. That has resulted in the hiring of a Maintenance Mechanic II.

Beginning this biennium we are also submitting a Decision Package for maintenance items that are beyond the skills of in-house staff and are below the minor works threshold. In the past we combined multiple deferred maintenance items into capital requests. These items were the first to be abandoned when funding didn't rise to the level requested.

We expect these changes to eliminate the maintenance backlog within three biennia.

Washington State Historical Society owns and maintains two facilities: State History Museum in Tacoma (HM), constructed in 1996 and Stadium Way Research Center (RC) in Tacoma, constructed in 1911, 1923, and 1971. The agency is requesting building preservation funding for these two facilities. This request is for the biennium 2025 portion of the facilities preservation projects recommended in the Washington State Historical Society 10-year Needs Assessment.

#### **Project Description**

One of the agency's strategic goals is to provide safe and well-maintained facilities for the collections and visiting public. It also directs us to preserve the state's investment in our facilities. To achieve the goal, the agency has updated our biennial facilities needs assessment to make sure the facilities are safe for our clientele and major building systems are in working order. Here is the project budget for each facility by sub-components:

#### PROBLEM STATEMENT

Many components of the Society's flagship facility, the Washington State History Museum, haven't been upgraded or replaced since it was built over 27 years ago. The heavily used public elevators are in need of updated controls, wiring, traveling cables, efficient motors, efficient lighting, and cab interior upgrades. The cost-effective useful life for elevators is 20-25 years; these elevators will be nearing 30 years of service when this project begins. The museum spends over \$22,000 per year to keep the aging elevators working. The public elevators are the only way for visitors with mobility limitations to move between floors.

#### PROPOSED SOLUTION

This project will modernize or replace the existing elevators under the guidance of a design team experienced in elevator replacement in existing buildings. Modernization will include updated assistance technologies for people with disabilities as well as CASPR automatic sanitation.

#### **Project Summary**

Washington State Historical Society owns and maintains two facilities: State History Museum in Tacoma (HM), constructed in 1996 and Stadium Way Research Center (RC) in Tacoma, constructed in 1911, 1923, and 1971. The agency is requesting program-related capital funding for renewal of the Great Hall of Washington History at the State History Museum

#### **Project Description**

#### **Problem Statement**

The prime mission of the WSHM is to present exhibitions pertaining to the history of Washington. The primary permanent exhibit space of the WSHM is the 20,000-SF Great Hall which was developed in 1995. Unlike temporary or traveling exhibits, permanent exhibits are a capital asset with an expected life of 15-20 years and are attached to the building as fixtures. The exhibition fixtures in the Great Hall are now both worn out from visitor use and out of date from a museum experience and historical scholarship perspective and must be replaced. In order to continue to attract and serve over 160,000 visitors biennially, the permanent exhibits in the Great Hall must remain engaging to visitors.

Over the past three biennia, three discrete sections of the Great Hall have been replaced and an interpretive masterplan has been written to provide direction for future updates. These sections are located along the periphery of the Great Hall of Washington History and are focused on the geological forces that shaped Washington State, ancient peoples, immigration and emigration to Washington, sea and land exploration, and the settlement/development of communities and industry as a result of Washington's unique landscape and geographic location (e.g. the timber industry, agriculture, deep water ports, and the railroad.) Each of these updates has been accomplished as a minor work project under \$1M.

The updates to these peripheral spaces have vastly improved the visitor experience, provided renewed scholarship, and allowed the Society to incorporate diverse new voices and multiple perspectives in our exploration of Washington State history that helps meet Society and State DEI objectives. As well, the new sections have been developed to align with OSPI essential academic learning requirements for Washington State K-12 students in state history and social studies in general. The majority of the square footage that comprises the Great Hall of Washington History, the large central section of the permanent gallery space, has not yet been updated and is our desired next area for renewal. Given the updates to the surrounding galleries, the central section now stands out as old, outdated and outmoded and does not present the Museum as an engaging modern museum for our visitors.

#### **Proposed Solution**

The proposed renewal of the large central area of the Great Hall gallery, what we call the CORE, will be focused on presenting the history of Washington's Tribal nations. The original treatment of this history that dates to the opening of the museum in 1996 is focused on tribes as they were when European explorers first arrived in Washington. This places Washington's Tribal nations specifically in the past, leaving the visitor with the impression that they are not the vibrant force that they are in Washington today. As well, the exhibition lacks proper and appropriate contemporary interpretation. For example, the gallery contains a reproduction of a Native American longhouse, but there is little to no exhibit context for the exhibit that explains to the visitor what they are seeing, how longhouses were used, the geographical siting and limits on them, and their role in Native American life, as well as who constructed the longhouse for the museum, a fact that is particularly salient, given that the majority of Native contributors to the original exhibition are now no longer with us. Some of the exhibition goals for this section are to:

- · Create an entry experience that acts as a physical land acknowledgement of the fact that the State History Museum sits on the historic lands of the Puyallup Tribe
- · Create a gallery experience that directly supports the "Since Time Immemorial" Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) required curriculum on Native American history and culture in Washington
- · Educates the visitor about the 29 federally recognized tribal nations in Washington
- · Educate the visitor about Tribal sovereignty and negotiated treaty rights
- · Provide an immersive exhibition experience that honors and reflects the different tribal cultures in Washington. These goals

will be achieved through and exhibition gallery that features interactive digital media, compelling storytelling, historical artifacts and contemporary Native art, and inspired design.

The legislature funded the design component of this project during the 21-23 biennium, and the project is currently in the schematic design phase, and on schedule to have completed construction documents by the end of the biennium. This phase has been led by the museum and its exhibition design contractor, Aldrich Pears and Associates. Additionally, the project has been guided by two contracted Native curators, Professor Danica Sterud-Miller and Todd Clark, who are the co-directors of the University of Washington Center for American Indian and Indigenous Studies. Finally, the Society's tribal liaison, Michael Finley, conducted outreach to all federally recognized tribes in the state inviting them to consult on the development of the gallery. Nine tribes have representatives appointed to serve on an advisory committee for the gallery, which has met four times to provide guidance and feedback to the project team. Other tribes have been kept informed of the project development at their request, but not appointed advisory committee members. A list of the advisory committee and their affiliations is attached.

The gallery will consist of an introductory section, four learning centers, a major central feature focused on tribal sovereignty and negotiated treaties, and a concluding section that is forward looking. Each of the four learning centers represent a teaching:

- · We are part of the land.
- · Knowledge imbues responsibility; knowledge is power.
- · We exercise our sovereignty to protect the land and the people.
- · Tribal economic power enriches all of our communities.

The teaching will be delivered via video content featuring tribal members speaking directly to the visitor. Surrounding each teaching will be five additional mini-exhibits that expand upon the teaching. For example, for the teaching "We are part of the land" the following topics will be explored in the surrounding exhibition elements: land allotments, the Boldt Decision and tribal fishing rights, land stewardship, and food sovereignty.

The emphasis of the gallery is on exploring tribal sovereignty and culture, how it was impacted by settlers and the ensuing treaty process, and how tribes have exercised their sovereignty and cultural traditions across time. Connections to land, the importance of cultural expression, historical injustices, and modern ways of life are all explored in depth. Elements of the schematic design document are attached representing visitor flow and exhibition conceptualization to-date. These documents should not be considered final at this stage, but will be finalized by the end of the current biennium, allowing the fabrication phase to begin July 1, 2023, if funded.

This request includes cost of removal of existing outdated exhibitions, new flooring, fabrication and installation of new exhibitions, and all infrastructure and IT costs associated with planned digital interactives and other multi-media elements. It is likely that, if funded, this appropriation will allow renewal of the first 70 % of the CORE, with removal of exhibitry and development of content in the final 30% of the CORE being developed as part of a future project. That future project will focus on creating a visitor flow route from the 3rd floor gallery up to the 5th floor galleries, as well as updating the current Columbia River Theatre and its entry, located at the far back wall of the Great Hall.

#### **Project Benefits**

The benefits to this project are numerous:

This project will support hiring among multiple trades, as well as historians, exhibition designers, IT professionals, and Native curators, historians, and artists.

The completed exhibition will provide direct support to K-12 school children as they learn about Native American history and culture under the mandated "Since Time Immemorial" curriculum. The Society normally hosts up to 16,000 children on school field trips each year and this gallery will provide an engaging, in-person experience to expand and support their learning requirements and social studies standards related to this topic.

Completion of this large portion of the gallery will essentially create a "museum-within-a-museum" that is focused on Native American history and culture that we expect to serve as a major destination-a draw for visitors, school groups, and tourists, which will increase ticket sales and earned revenue. Surveys of visitors to our museum indicate that contemporary viewpoints to Native American history is one of their top interests.

#### **Description**

A new exhibition will have a 15-20 year life span, serving general visitors, school field trips, and group tours on a daily basis, normally 80,000+ people each year.

The project represents a major step forward in the telling of Washington State history as it relates to tribal history, with the interpretive content and approach Native led and told from an indigenous perspective. If funded, this project will be completed in time to anchor Washington State's commemoration of the US semiquincentennial (USA250). By exploring in-depth our state's indigenous history and culture, we can commemorate the contributions and knowledge that Native peoples have brought to this land, prior to Washington statehood, and prior to the founding of the US. The exhibit will explore in-depth the US government treaties with tribal nations, and therefore serve as a foundation for understanding the nature of tribal – US government relations across time. It will detail historical injustices, as well as contemporary successes for tribal nations and ensure that all Washingtonians have a richer understanding of the role of Native peoples in Washington State and US history.





### 4.1 Gallery Narrative

#### Concept

The Living Sovereignty Gallery is a central spine of the museum that examines Washington State through a specific historical lens – that the state is what it is today because of intentional actions perpetrated against Native peoples' self-determination, and their responses to those actions. The gallery features open circulation through investigative exhibits centered on four core teachings. Tactile, multi-sensory exhibits and contemporary art are featured prominently, offering visitors an experience that intentionally departs from those traditionally found in historical museums. The voice of the institution will take a back seat to historical and contemporary primary sources, encouraging visitors to draw their own conclusions and develop critical thinking skills.

Visitors encounter 5 chapters in their visit to the Living Sovereignty Gallery:

#### 1. Intro

A piece of powerful contemporary artwork gives voice to the "big idea" of the gallery — a personal perspective from which to explore the theme. Updatable music and contemporary pop culture videos showcasing Indigenous youth bring movement, color and life to this space.

These unconventional media show visitors right away that this will be a very different type of history gallery.

### 2. Teachings

Four mini-theaters, each with five "satellite" nodes, invite open-ended exploration. The mini-theaters introduce core teachings, while the nodes focus on related case studies and thematic stories. Visitors chart their own path between the nodes, discovering surprising connections and revisiting events and stories from multiple perspectives. Nodes will feature a range of media, from smell dispensers to hands-on objects to computer interactives.

#### 3. Sovereignty

A high-quality new media production features a large wall projection, filled with dynamic animations of traditional stories focused on sovereignty. Here, visitors explore the idea that only the land itself can grant sovereignty and consider what sovereignty means.


#### 4. Settlement and Treaties

A dramatic structure made of transparent, oversized treaties houses multimedia exhibits that focus on the role of treaties in enabling the nation and state. Visitors examine evidence and consider multiple perspectives to build new understandings for themselves.

#### 5. Outro (Future Histories)

A contemporary artwork explores the gallery theme from a forward-looking perspective. Visitors are invited to reflect on the gallery and imagine possible futures that honor Indigenous ways of knowing. This concluding experience solidifies visitors' understandings so they can carry their new knowledge through the rest of their museum journey and into their lives.

# 5.3 Relationship to the "Since Time Immemorial" Curriculum

The Living Sovereignty Gallery will support the Washington state-mandated "Since Time Immemorial: Tribal Sovereignty in Washington State" curriculum for K-12 students. This Tribally developed curriculum has been endorsed by all 29 federally recognized Tribes in the state.

The goal of the "Since Time Immemorial" curriculum is to "educate…youth who are our future leaders, about Tribal history, culture, treaty rights, contemporary Tribal and state government institutions and relations and the contribution of Indian nations to the state of Washington in a culturally sensitive manner."

The curriculum will serve as an important touchstone for the Living Sovereignty Gallery. Some of the messages, goals, topics and case studies included in the lesson plans will be reflected in the gallery content — but not exclusively. The curriculum was intended to be a scaffold, a foundation on which to develop relationships between individual schools and the Tribes in their area. In the spirit of this intent, the WSHS will tailor the exhibit content to the needs of its audience, its role as a state institution that represents stories from across Washington, and its position to use the museum exhibit context to tell stories in different media and contexts than those available in the classroom.

To that end, the gallery will support the investigation of the curriculum's "Essential Questions" — a list of questions about Tribal sovereignty — but will not use the curriculum as a prescriptive framework.



#### **Essential Questions**

- 1. How does physical geography affect the distribution, culture, and economic life of local Tribes?
- 2. What is the legal status of Tribes who negotiated or who did not negotiate settlement for compensation for the loss of their sovereign homelands?
- 3. What were the political, economic, and cultural forces consequential to the treaties that led to the movement of Tribes from long-established homelands to reservations?
- 4. What are ways in which Tribes respond to the threats and outside pressure to extinguish their cultures and independence?
- 5. What do local Tribes do to meet the challenges of reservation life; and as sovereign nations, what do local Tribes do to meet the economic and cultural needs of their Tribal communities?

A review of the "Since Time Immemorial" curriculum demonstrates that the Essential Questions and topics covered by the curriculum overlay nicely on the key ideas identified for the Living Sovereignty Gallery. There is great potential to develop educational materials for the gallery that align the exhibit content and the curriculum.

The exhibition will use the Essential Questions as the umbrella that guides selection of specific stories and topics; the museum complements the curriculum but is not limited by the lesson units themselves.

#### Access to Story

As an inquiry-based learning model, the curriculum suggests entry points to the Living Sovereignty Gallery content for visitors such as:

- Personal history family, culture, personal values, community values
- Connection between people and places

Fundamentally, the "Since Time Immemorial" curriculum approach encourages teachers and students to address essential questions in the context of Tribes in their own communities.

### **Graphics Approach**

#### **Typeface**

Acumin Variable Concept is the typeface chosen for the museum voice because of its versatility and straightforward form.

Source Sans Pro will be used for all Indigenous voices throughout the gallery. Source Sans is a very legible font as well as having character and personality. It is very compatible with all Indigenous languages.

Other typefaces will be used if and when nexcessary to replicate or pull-out portions of text from original documents for closer examination.

#### **Palette**

- Gray represents the museum voice: its presence will be neutral and subtle, reflecting the intent of the role of this voice.
- The intent is to let evidence speak for itself, so the palette of original sources will be part of the gallery pallette.
- Show authentic material as much as possible, and enhance it. E.g. certain words or quotes can be pulled out from real documents to bring attention to and highlight them.
- A neutral gray palette provides an opportunity to color-code setter and Indigenous perspectives, if desired.
- Bright bold colors in artwork and contemporary imagery will come to life and "pop" against the gray.

### **Digital Media Approach**

The use of digital media throughout the gallery will support the following goals:

#### Provide a Platform for Indigenous Voices

- Reinforce the vibrancy and presence of contemporary Indigenous peoples in Washington through audio and video of individuals sharing their personal stories and experiences.
- Allow for the representation of more individuals without increasing exhibit footprint, with the goal of representing the diversity of Tribal people across the state.

#### *Keep Content Current and Contemporary*

- Respond to contemporary culture, current events, and news related to Tribal communities using Content Management Systems (CMS).
- These allow staff to add, remove, and rotate through relevant content via a simple web-based interface.
- There are limited resources at the museum to dedicate to this task, so use of CMS will be limited, and the expectation is that updates will be strategic and infrequent.

#### Invigorate the Space with Indigenous Energy

• Reflect the dynamism of Indigenous cultures in Washington by animating the space through movement, light, audio, and video.

#### **Explore Complex Relationships and Connections**

• Connect key concepts and follow events across time and perspectives through investigative digital interactives.

#### Augment Content Communicated Through Other Media

- Layer digital content into other experiences to augment visitors' understandings of key messages or explore stories more deeply
- Create opportunities to seamlessly blend digital media into backdrops, tactile surfaces, and behind veneers to provide unexpected ways to engage and build in redundancy if one mode of delivery is unavailable.

#### Create Infrastructure to Support Digital Artists

• This approach will support the integration of artists' work into the interpretive spaces by developing hardware systems to display digital content.



#### **Digital Media Categories**

#### 1. Teaching Projections

**Content:** Personal expressions of a core teaching, articulated by Elders or other teachers from Native communities across the state. Footage demonstrating those teachings in action in the community.

*Format:* Semi-circular projection surface, partially enclosed. Three or four "teachers" will be featured per teaching. The video for each teacher will include two types of footage, intercut to keep it dynamic:

- an interview in a relevant location (e.g. in a language classroom, carving shed, hatchery, cultural center, etc.)
- the interviewee actively living the teaching (e.g. language practice with kids, carving, fishing, in a political meeting, protesting, etc.)

#### 2. Investigative Interactives

**Content:** The details and nuance revealed in each interactive depends on the topics being investigated. This category of experience can support the exploration of timelines, case studies, objects, catalysts, and acts of sovereignty associated with each teaching.

*Format:* Projections and touchscreens are the most typical interfaces visitors encounter in these interactives, with opportunities for physical interfaces to be integrated where possible.

#### Digital Art / Content

Content: Media created by digital artists for a variety of platforms, pulled into the gallery to add another aspect of Indigenous cultural expression into the space. Can be updated by museum staff via CMS.

Format: Appear as visual projection/screens or audio, depending on the needs of the artists and their work

#### **Provocative Statements/Questions**

Content: Text statements and questions that can be updated over time and possibly appear in multiple languages

Format: A digital display hidden beneath veneer, when lit up, reveals the provocative text

### 7.4 Approach to Objects

### 7.4.1 Role of Objects

#### Why use objects in the gallery?

Original materials, including objects, art, photographs and ephemera, are evidence of the time they were created. This is as true of "current" objects such as contemporary art as it is of historical artifacts. Displaying and interpreting them gives visitors a window on the past and its relationship to the present.

Objects can tell many stories — the history of their creation and use and the longer story of generations of knowledge and teaching. Visitors connect emotionally to these stories by interacting with "the real thing."

Objects also embody complex questions about representation, creation and power. They contain the narrative of the museum's existence, priorities, development, and relationship to creators. These invisible storylines can be made visible through interpretation. Objects act as primary sources in this exhibition, while supporting a dualistic approach to "voice" throughout its storyline.

Physically, tactile objects, such as new everyday objects or material samples, invite a different type of visitor interaction, one that emphasizes sensory stimulation, physical understanding and an exploration of craft.

The way objects are selected, interpreted and displayed creates an intentional intellectual, emotional and physical experience for visitors. In the Living Sovereignty Gallery, objects will:

- Illustrate the gallery theme
- · Visually and conceptually anchor specific interpretive content
- Invite tactile interaction and exploration
- Act as conduits for provocative questions and ideas
- Encourage emotional connections
- Support the goal of creating an "Indigenous space"
- Create an emotional response

#### 7.4.2 What Do We Mean by "Objects"?

#### **Collection Categories**

The museum is considering inclusion of a wide range of types of objects for this exhibit. From a collections standpoint, objects fall into two categories.

**Permanent collection:** Artifacts in the museum's permanent collection. They have been accessioned to the museum's care, and are held in public trust. Display and conservation considerations are in place to preserve and protect them.

**Teaching collection:** A "hands-on" collection used with Museum Educators in the museum spaces. These objects are intended to be used in activities, demonstrations, and exhibitions. It is expected they will experience wear and tear during educational programs or public display; they are considered expendable. This category could include reproduction artifacts or duplicates from the permanent collection. The teaching collection is a non-accessioned collection and thus not held in the public trust.

**Sharing collection:** A new category for items that are acquired specifically to be touched and handled by museum visitors in an unsupervised exhibit. These objects will be left open and unattended in the gallery. When commissioned, it is advisable to acquire multiples as they will inevitably need to be replaced.

#### Types of Objects

Within these collection categories, the exhibit development team is considering the following types of objects to tell stories in the gallery:

**Art:** includes art from the museum's permanent collection and site-specific, permanent commissioned installations in the museum.

**Artifacts:** includes objects from the museum's permanent collection.





**Commissioned Sharing Objects:** Created by Tribal members. These could be replicas or reinterpretations of objects in the WSHS collection or elsewhere, but will most likely be new creations from the maker's imagination. Handmade objects highlight the continuity of traditions across generations and showcase traditional materials and techniques. This category could include carvings, woven mats, baskets and textiles, material samples or works in progress showing construction techniques.

**Commissioned Contemporary Art:** Artwork created specifically for this project to reflect an artist's perspective of the gallery themes and teachings.

**Ephemera:** Original 2D material in the museum's collection. The gallery will display original material as much as possible, for authenticity, noting a robust rotation schedule. Digital reproductions can be incorporated into print graphics and audiovisuals. Digital copies of works from other institutions may also be included. Printed reproductions can be made as needed to create tactile, handleable items.

**Photographs:** Original photographs in the museum or other institution's collection. The gallery will display original material as much as possible, for authenticity, noting a robust rotation schedule. Digital reproductions can be incorporated into print graphics and audiovisuals. Digital copies of works from other institutions may also be included. Printed reproductions can be made as needed to create tactile, handleable items.

# INDIANS ON COAST UPHELD IN FISHING

U.S. Judge Rules Treaties Insure Rights of 14 Tribes

#### Special to The New York Times

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 12-Federal District Judge George H. Boldt ruled here today in a long-awaited decision that Washington State fishing regulations were unlawful when applied to 14 western Washington Indian tribes.

He ruled that the tribes. whose fishing rights are guaranteed by treaties, could not be regulated in fishing except when it was necessary to preserve stocks of salmon and steelhead trout.

State regulations prohibit net fishing in rivers by non-Indians. The regulations permit limited net fishing by Indians, but Judge Boldt's ruling now permits the Indians to regulate their own fishing to a large degree.

However, the judge ruled that each of the 14 tribes must establish tribal regulations and also certification documents for each fisherman. In addition, the tribes must report their catches to state fisheries and game officers.

#### **Proof Required**

To be completely free of state regulation, Judge Boldt said, each tribe will have to convince the court that it is managing its fishery efficiently and enforcing its regulations vigorously.

Judge Boldt assumed watchdog role over disputes involving the Indians' fishing rights, saying that his court would maintain jurisdiction over the case.


#### **Rotation Plan**


A rotation plan will need to be developed by the curators for all original materials, historic and contemporary. Site-specific commissioned artworks will not be subjects to a rotation plan.

#### **Settlement and Treaties**


A dramatic central structure consisting of giant, transparent treaties signed in Washington State loom over visitors in the middle of the gallery.

Inside, visitors interact with a map of the country showing all the treaties signed between Tribal Nations and the United States. An overlaid animation shows the expansion of the country as treaties are signed, bringing home the idea that the USA used treaties to legitimize its nationhood. Visitors can scrub through the animation to see changes to the map over time, and slow down when they get to Washington State for a deeper dive.

Around the outside of the treaty structure, visitors explore other exhibits that cover treaties. They can quiz themselves to see what they know about treaties and discover the truth behind misconceptions about what treaties are and what they mean to the people of Washington.

Visitors handle a replica of a treaty and a replica of an executive order and hear first-hand from two Tribal leaders how the same issue would play out differently for a nation that has signed a treaty than a nation subject to an executive order. A graphic timeline depicts treaties and executive orders within the evolution of political and other tools used to restrict Native rights. It also includes the stories of Indigenous reclamation of treaty rights today.

An interactive digital treaty invites exploration of the backstory of the treaty process by inviting visitors to explore highlighted words, passages, and sections of the treaty with a critical eye. What did this placename mean to the Tribal community? What did it mean to the settlers negotiating the treaty? What did this signatory to the treaty tell his people about the treaty process? The highlighted sections could open portraits, journals and other evidence of the time.

#### **Project Summary**

The Washington State Historical Society owns and maintains two facilities: State History Museum in Tacoma (HM), constructed in 1996 and Stadium Way Research Center (RC) in Tacoma, constructed in 1911, 1923, and 1971. The agency is requesting capital funding for renewal and upgrade of the audiovisual media and digital interactive displays on the third floor of the State History Museum.

#### **Project Description**

#### **Problem Statement**

The Washington State History Museum showcases a series of exhibits showcasing Washington's history, from hundreds of millions of years ago up to the present day. The main exhibition space of the Washington State History Museum is on the third floor. This 20,000 square foot Great Hall was developed over 25 years ago, in 1995. The Great Hall features a series of digital interactive exhibits that were created in the late 1990's that are visibly uncontemporary by today's standards. These digital interactive exhibits are past their expected life span, and they are no longer compelling to the museum's visitors who are much more technologically savvy than they were when the museum opened in 1997. The computers and media players that drive these interactives are also antiquated, resulting in slow performance times, awkward visitor interface, and a disproportionate amount of maintenance by museum staff.

Further, the digital content displayed on the screens was contemporary and compelling when the museum opened in 1997, however video clips now look old-fashioned and past their prime. Over the past four biennia, three sections of the Great Hall have been replaced. Each of these updates has been accomplished as a minor work project under \$1M. The updates to these peripheral spaces have vastly improved the visitor experience, and the compelling nature of the newer digital interactives within these spaces shines a negative light on the older interactive displays.

Many of the older digital interactives are not open captioned, and thus not consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act. This does not afford visually-impaired guests the same interpretive opportunities as sighted visitors. Additionally, many of these digital interactives also run off of Macromedia Flash, which is no longer supported by new computers.

As the audiovisual equipment and software continue to age, now is the appropriate time to make these upgrades. Delaying this upgrade will have the potential to cost more in the future and this upgrade can be appropriately timed to be installed during the winter of 2024-2025 when the attendance at the museum is at its lightest.

This is the first time we have made this capital request.

#### **Proposed Solution**

The proposed upgrade to the digital interactive displays will bring the museum into the 21st Century. We aim to meet our visitor's expectations by taking the following steps:

- · Upgrading and installing three computers and touchscreen monitors in the *Shaping a New World* Gallery. These monitors have a slow visitor interface. Updated content will also be presented on one of the monitors. All video clips embedded into existing digital interactives will also have open caption added.
- · In the World War II exhibits there exists a timed show featuring lightboxes, sounds, and a video monitor behind scrims. This proposal includes a newer monitor to replace the one that is no longer operational.
- · Below the replica of an electrical transmission tower there is a bank of four monitors in which visitors can play a "Q and A" game testing their knowledge of the Columbia Basin. We propose to replace each of the stations with new equipment and new digital content. One monitor is non-functional and as the program for all four monitors is linked, they must all be upgraded.
- · Along the east end of the Main Gallery there is a bank of seven listening stations where visitors can hear old-time radio

broadcasts. The audio quality is sub-optimal and one of the stations is not working. We propose to replace each of these stations with new digital audio repeaters that can replay the broadcasts more consistently.

- · In the gallery's replica of a Hooverville shack, there is audio that is no longer working. We propose to replace the digital audio repeater and speaker.
- · All of the older exhibits in the Great Hall are run from a show controller that turns all of the exhibits on in the morning and off in the evening and programs their order of operation. We propose to make substantial upgrades to this show controller, including an upgrade from serial control to ethernet control.

#### **Project Benefits**

The benefits of this substantial audiovisual upgrade are many:

- o Visitors to the museum will now be presented with more contemporary learning experiences. This is particularly relevant to supporting K-12 school children who are digitally connected and unimpressed with the computer interactives that are either not compelling or not working properly. The museum normally hosts up to 16,000 students on field trip visits (Covid notwithstanding). This renovation will ensure these younger visitors are presented with more engaging opportunities that support their learning requirements.
- o This upgrade will also have a 15–20-year lifespan and serve approximately 80,000 visitors per year.
- o This project will also support jobs within the state of Washington. It will provide work for content developers, audiovisual integration specialists, and software designers.
- o The upgrades will also be more accommodating to the museum's visually impaired guests.
- o The interactive exhibits will no longer be seen as outdated and obsolete, helping the museum showcase its content in a more inspiring and modern fashion.
- o The Washington State History Museum offers excellent interpretive exhibits at a fair and modest price that is commensurate with other visitor experiences in the South Puget Sound area. The Museum also provides equity for those who are financially disadvantaged by offering free admission on from 3:00 to 8:00 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month. Completing this audiovisual upgrade will substantially enhance what the visitor sees in the museum, creating a better guest experience for all
- o This project will also follow LEAN Initiative principals. It will strategically focus on only those digital elements that are in vital need of upgrading. Exhibits that are scheduled to be replaced or exhibits that are currently performing well will not be replaced or upgraded.

#### **Outcomes**

Our request will have many positive outcomes for the State of Washington. This includes the following:

The work is consistent with many goals in the Governor's Results Washington priorities. In addition to the obvious educational benefits of upgrading these interactive displays, the new computers in these exhibits will be newer and thus more energy efficient. There will be an energy savings of approximately 20 per cent when compared to the larger computers and monitors they are replacing.

We also expect this upgrade to have positive outcomes from the perspective of our guests. Upon review of the Museum's reviews on TripAdvisor, the Museum has overwhelmingly positive reviews. The only two-star (negative) review that has been received in the last four years mentioned the problem of malfunctioning exhibits. With this funding, the museum will be more engaging, more contemporary, and provide positive experiences for our visitors who have come to expect great things when visiting a State History Museum.

#### **Project Summary**

The agency anticipates an appropriation of up to \$10 million for Heritage Capital Projects (HCP) under the terms of RCW 27.34.330. These funds provide up to one-third of the cost of local capital projects undertaken by non-profit organizations, tribes, and various local government entities. Projects that provide for the preservation and interpretation of the heritage of the state are submitted by applicants, reviewed and ranked by an advisory panel, and submitted for inclusion in the agency's state capital budget. Since 1997, over \$96 million have been appropriated to support 397 projects. Each state dollar has helped attract at least two dollars of other support. For this biennium, the advisory panel selected 29 projects out of 33 submissions that met threshold requirements.

#### **Project Description**

The purpose of HCP fund is to "support capital needs and facilities of heritage organizations, tribal governments, public development authorities, and local government agencies that interpret and preserve Washington's history and heritage" (WAC255-02-010). Projects need to have a minimum total budget of \$30,000; request a grant of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$1,000,000; involve property that will be held a minimum of 13 years beyond project completion; provide at least a \$2 match for each \$1 of HCP grant funds; comply with the Governor's Executive Order 21-02; and comply with all applicable and current federal, state, and local laws, regulations and policies regarding state funding, including high performance ("green") building standards (RCW 39.35 D), unless exempt. Each applicant needs to demonstrate a significant public benefit in the form of heritage interpretation and preservation activities that will occur via completion of their project and for a 13-year period after project completion. An applicant must demonstrate in the application that it has the readiness and capacity to undertake and complete their capital project in a timely fashion. In the current round, the required cost share (or match) in hand at the time of application was 3/4ths of the total indicated in the total project cost figure. The remaining match must be documented before grant contract execution.

The Washington State Historical Society (WSHS), administers the Heritage Capital Program with support from the HCP Advisory Panel which recommends grant guidelines for approval by the WSHS Director. The Washington Museum Association, the Office of the Secretary of State, Eastern Washington State Historical Society, Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation, and citizen members at-large are represented on the panel. In July or August of even-numbered years, the panel members independently evaluate and score each grant application to create the ranked list that WSHS submits as part of its agency budget to the Legislature.

#### **Opportunity or Problem**

The State of Washington has affirmed that Washington has a "rich heritage in historical sites and artifacts that have the potential to provide life-long learning opportunities for citizens of the state" and that "many of these historical treasures are not readily accessible to citizens, and that there is a need to create an ongoing program to support the capital needs of heritage organizations and facilities." To meet this need, the Heritage Capital Projects (HCP) competitive grant program was authorized in 1995 (RCW 27.34.330). New projects continue to be brought forward by local applicants to serve local needs for heritage preservation and interpretation demonstrating the clear need for this ongoing capital projects grant program.

#### Support for the Agency and Statewide Results

The operation of this grant program dovetails with the other work of the agency, including providing technical assistance to non-profits and government entities in the operation of facilities, security, collections management, exhibit development, educational excellence, cultural emergency response and preparedness, and public programming and events. The statewide nature of successful applicants over the years has necessarily involved the agency in assisting entities in all areas of the state.

#### **Specific Benefits**

Historic buildings have been preserved, utilized, and revitalized; museums have been built and expanded; historic transportation vehicles have been restored; interpretive centers and longhouses have been built; historic landscapes have

been reconstructed; and local and national landmarks have been protected through capital expenditures, all while requiring robust public access and being guided in best field practices for historic preservation and history interpretation.

The state dollars that go into the dozens of HCP projects each biennium leverage additional public, corporate, philanthropic, and individually donated funds. Staff has repeatedly heard that the state dollars have provided a needed indication of support for projects, as applicants seek to raise local funds for historic preservation and heritage interpretation bricks and mortar work during sometimes rocky economic times. The lack of state funding may not stop these efforts completely, but would slow the achievement of local capital projects and could prevent timely protection of significant and endangered places and artifacts, putting them at greater risk of being irretrievably lost.

#### Other State Programs Effected

The Washington State Department of Archeology and Historic Preservation reviews all proposed Heritage Capital Projects for their compliance with Governor's Executive Order 21-02 and to confirm that those facilities that are a focus of the grants and are listed or eligible for the National Register of Historic Places adhere to the national "Secretary of Interior's Standards for Treatment of Historic Properties."

#### Agency's Funding Strategy

The Washington State Historical Society serves as the administrator of the Heritage Capital Projects program retaining 3% of each appropriation to fund the administration work.
