This has led to a number of organizations requesting certification to provide mental health treatment in addition to their chemical dependency treatment programs, and also to provide that treatment based on a closer alignment to best practices and fidelity models of treatment. A number of these certifications were issued to agencies in King County, which in several cases was the result of larger providers entering into subcontracts with multiple smaller providers.
