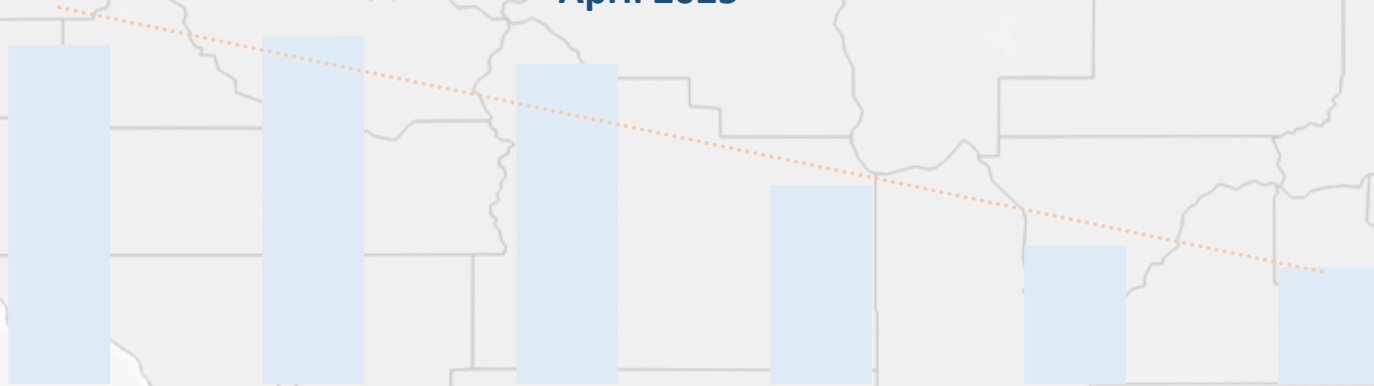


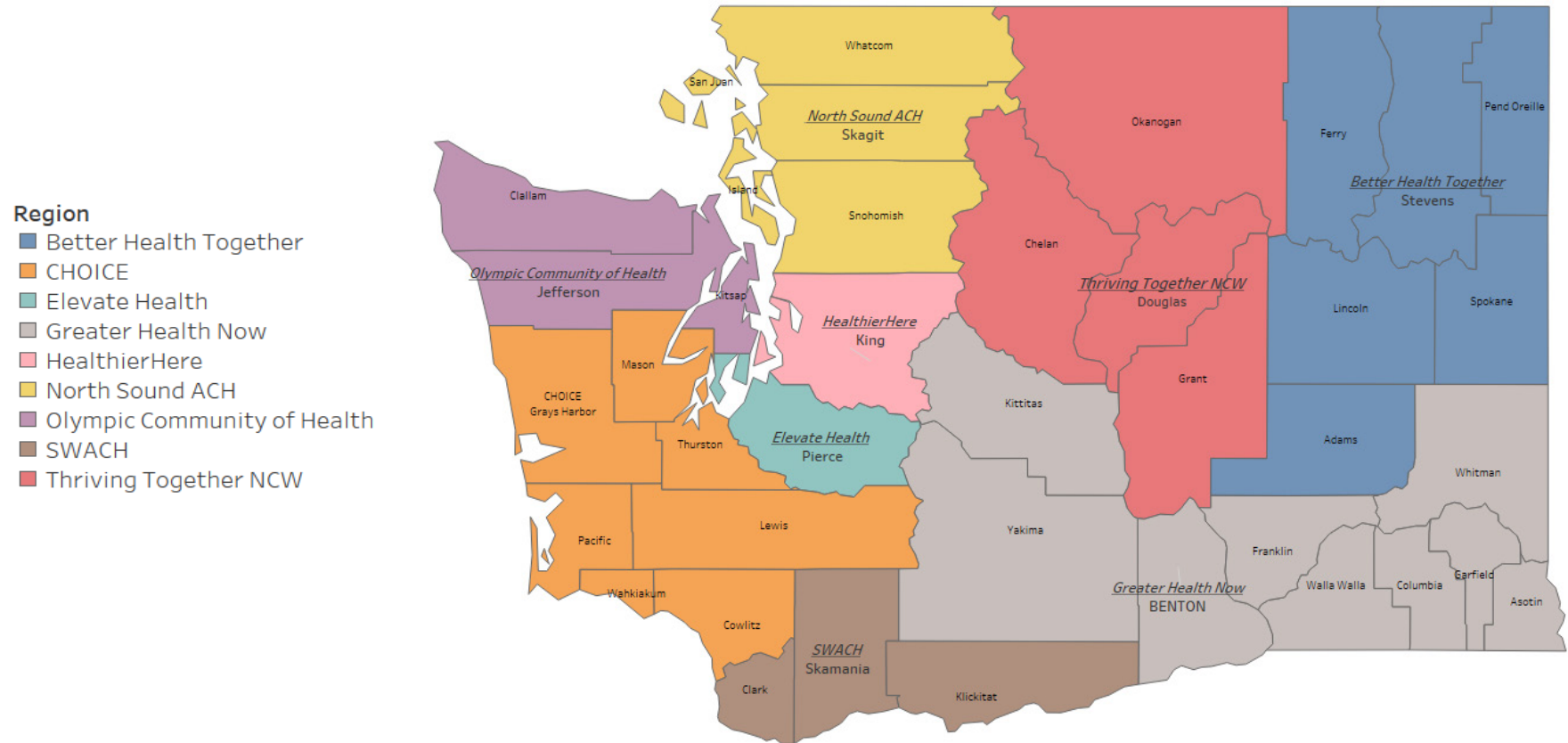

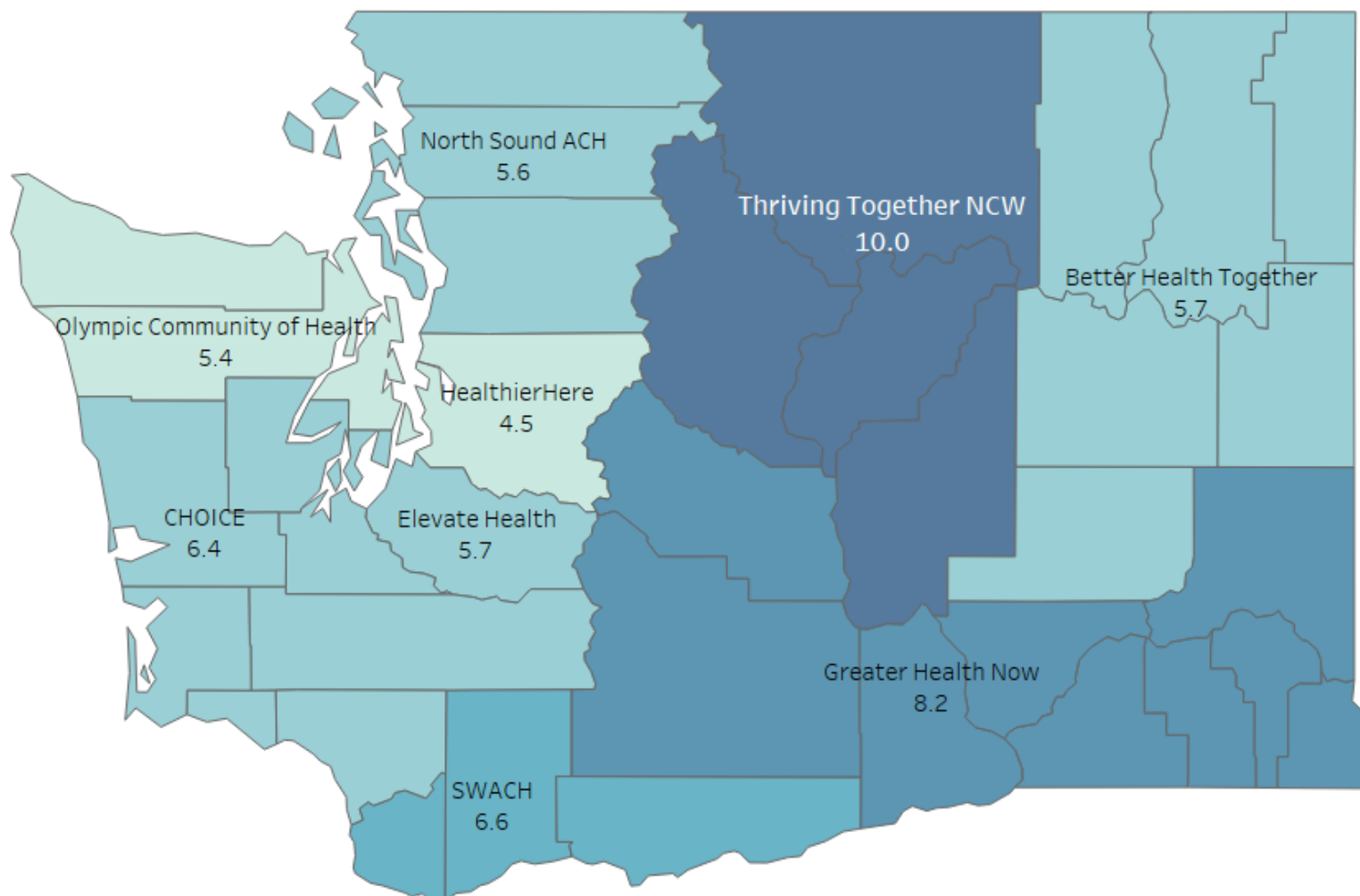
Figure 1 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2015	1

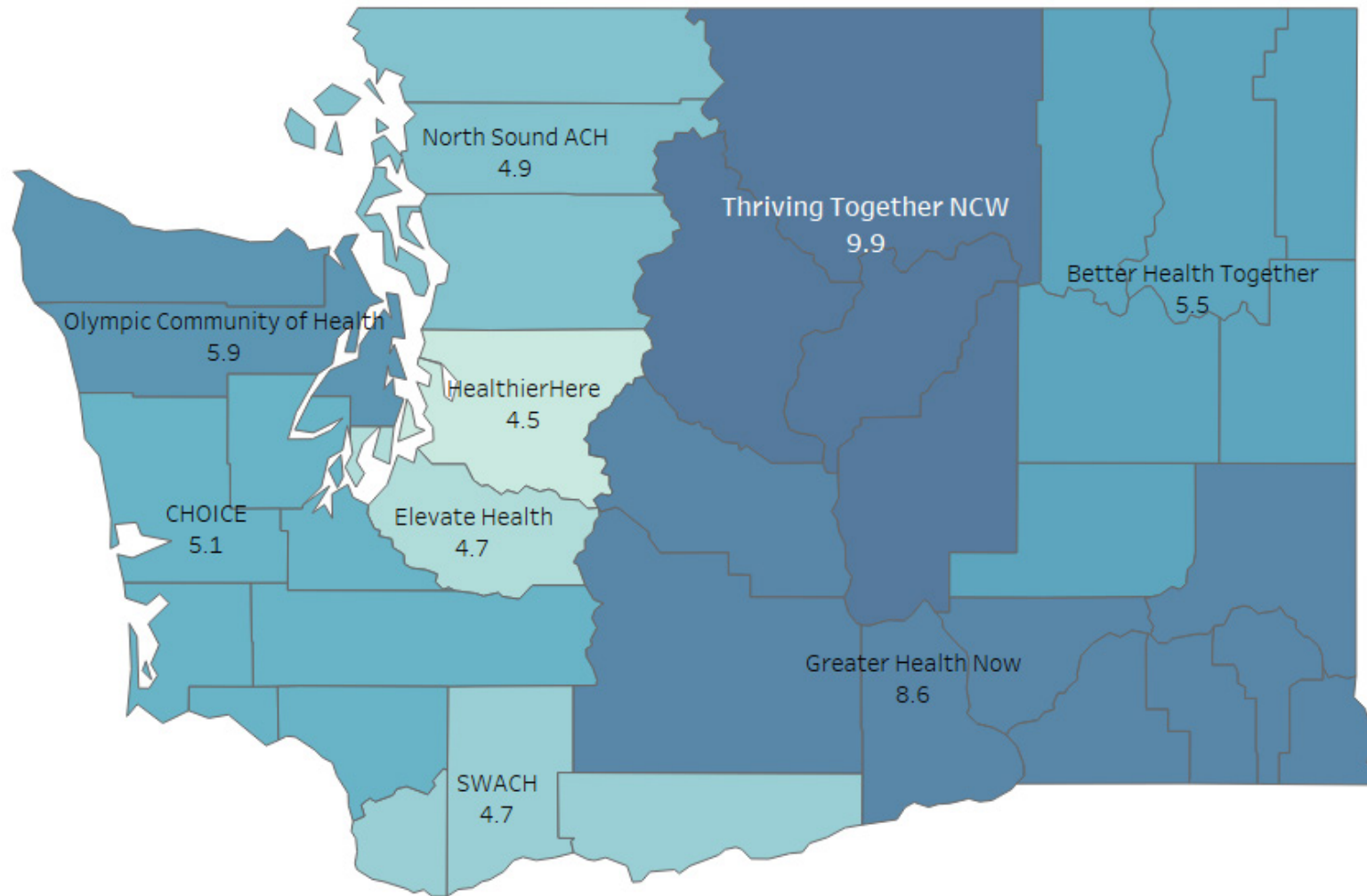

Figure 1 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2015



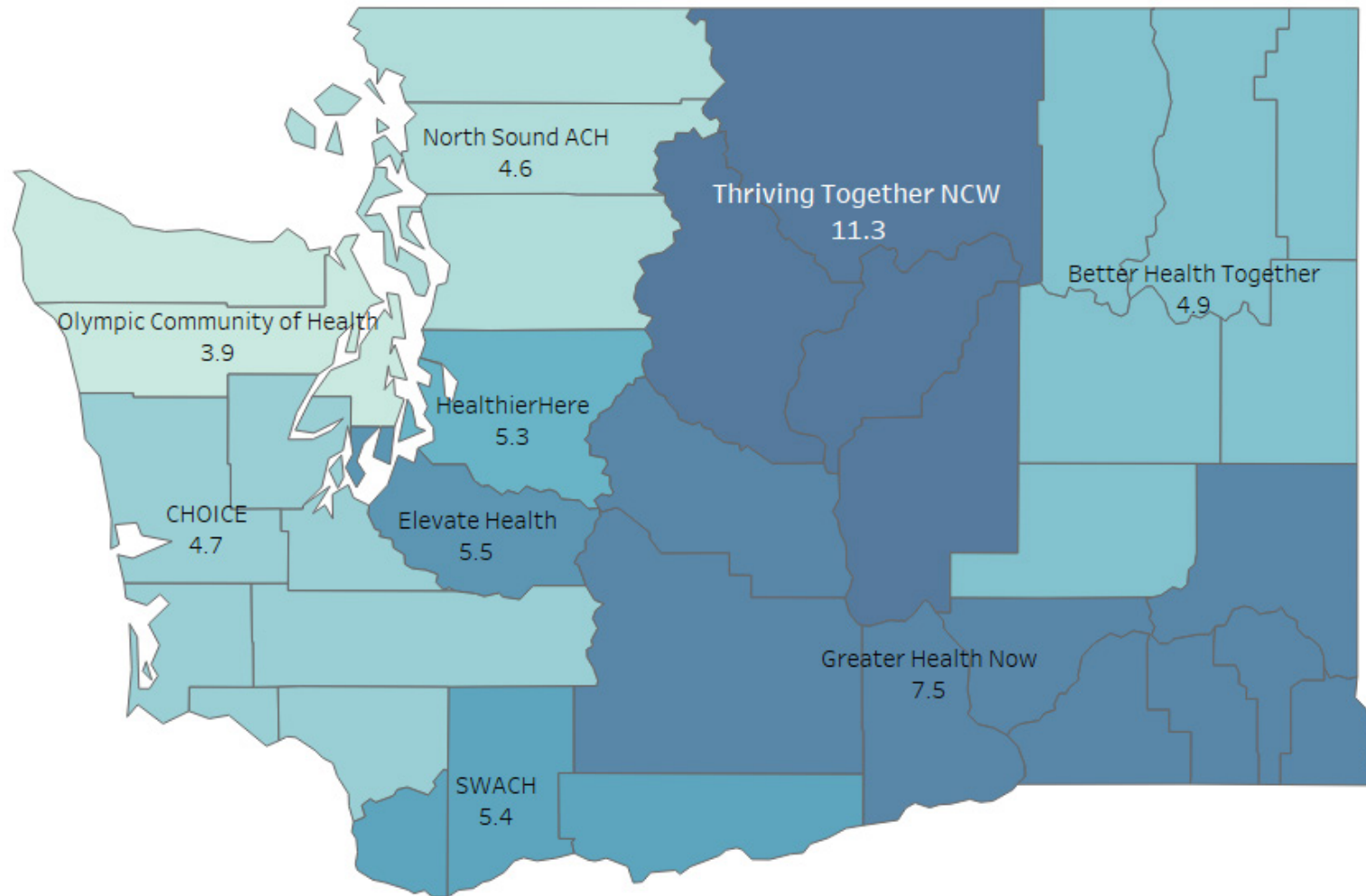
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Figure 2 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2016



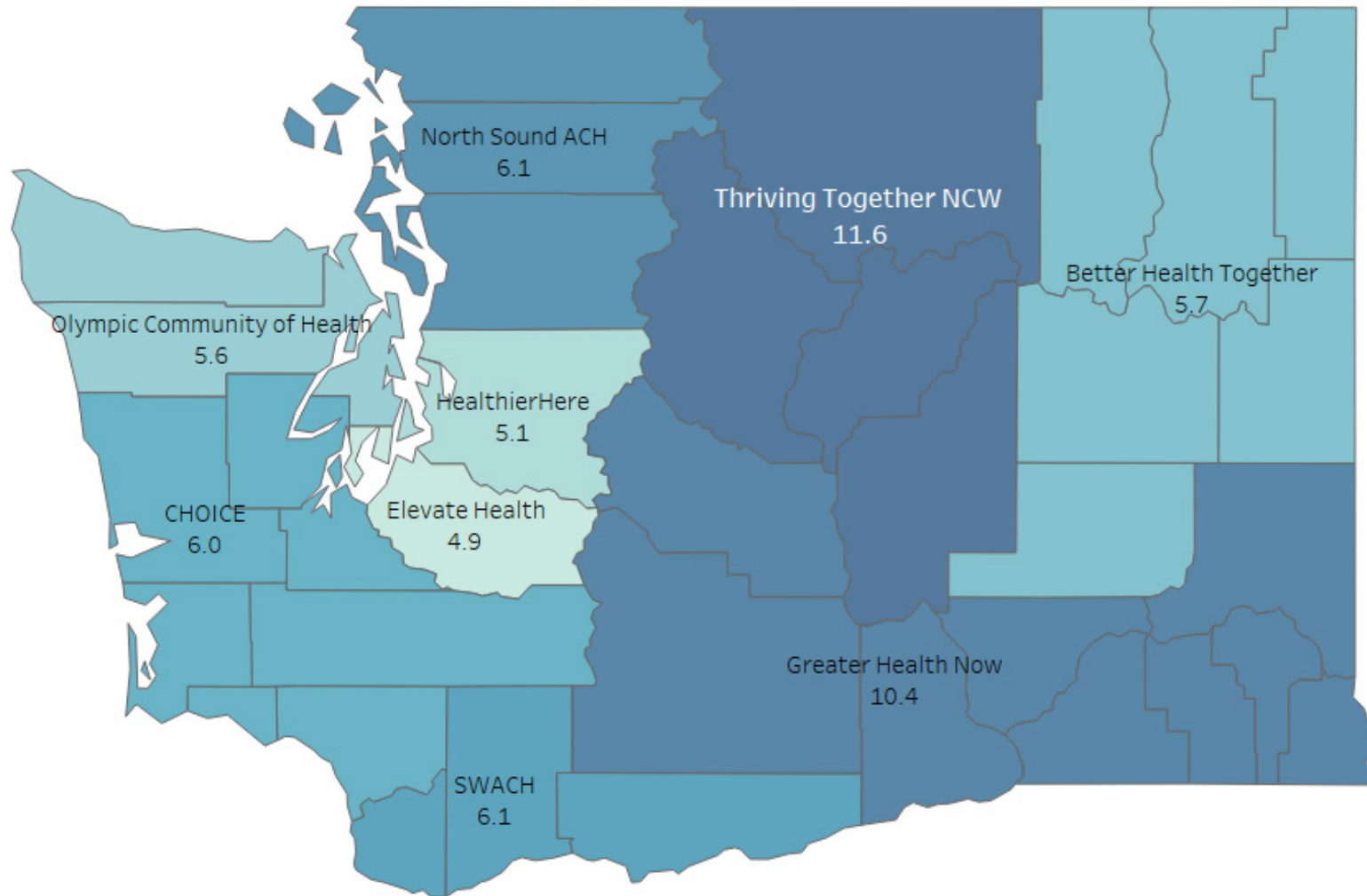
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Figure 3 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2017



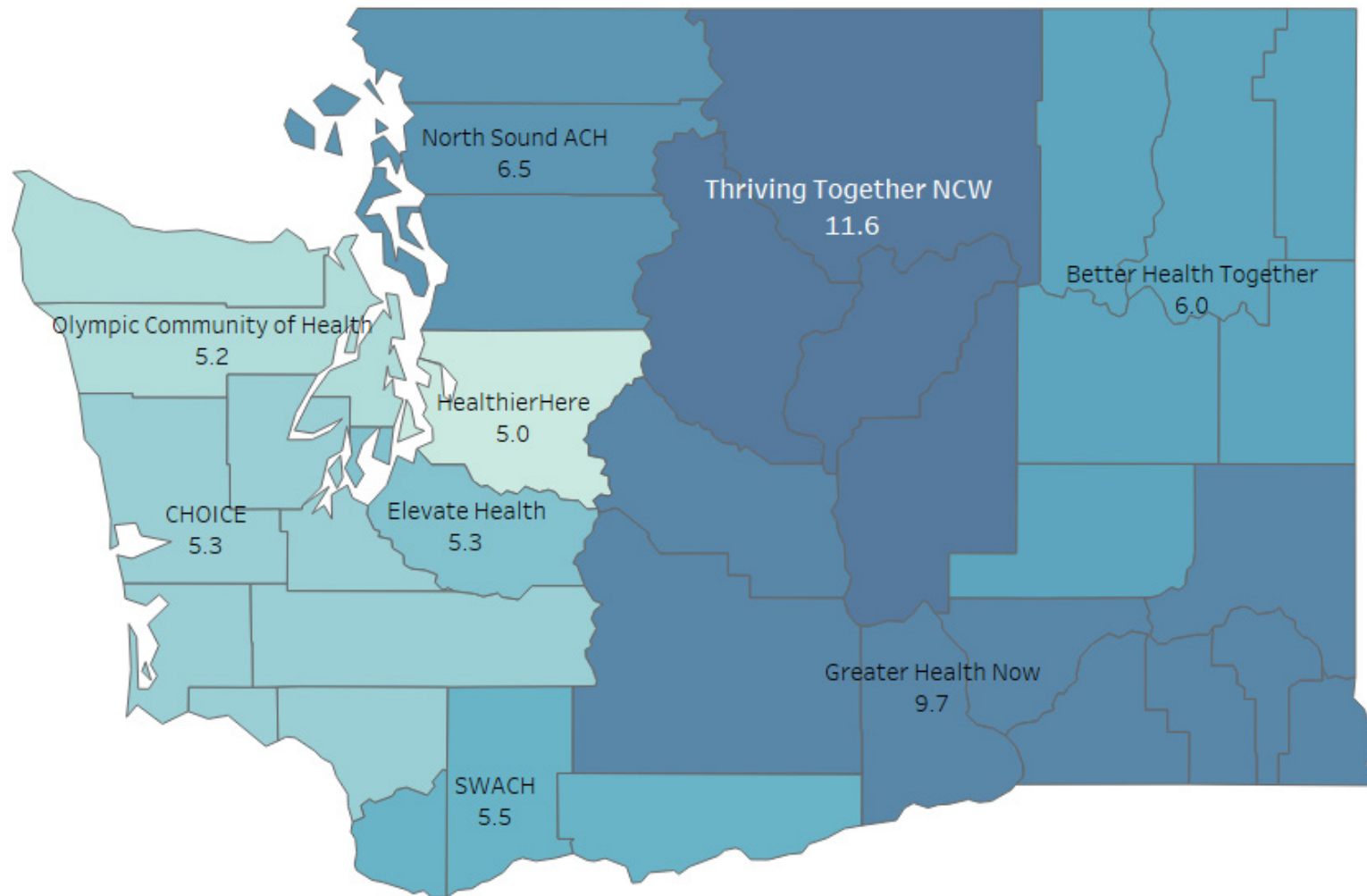
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Figure 4 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2018



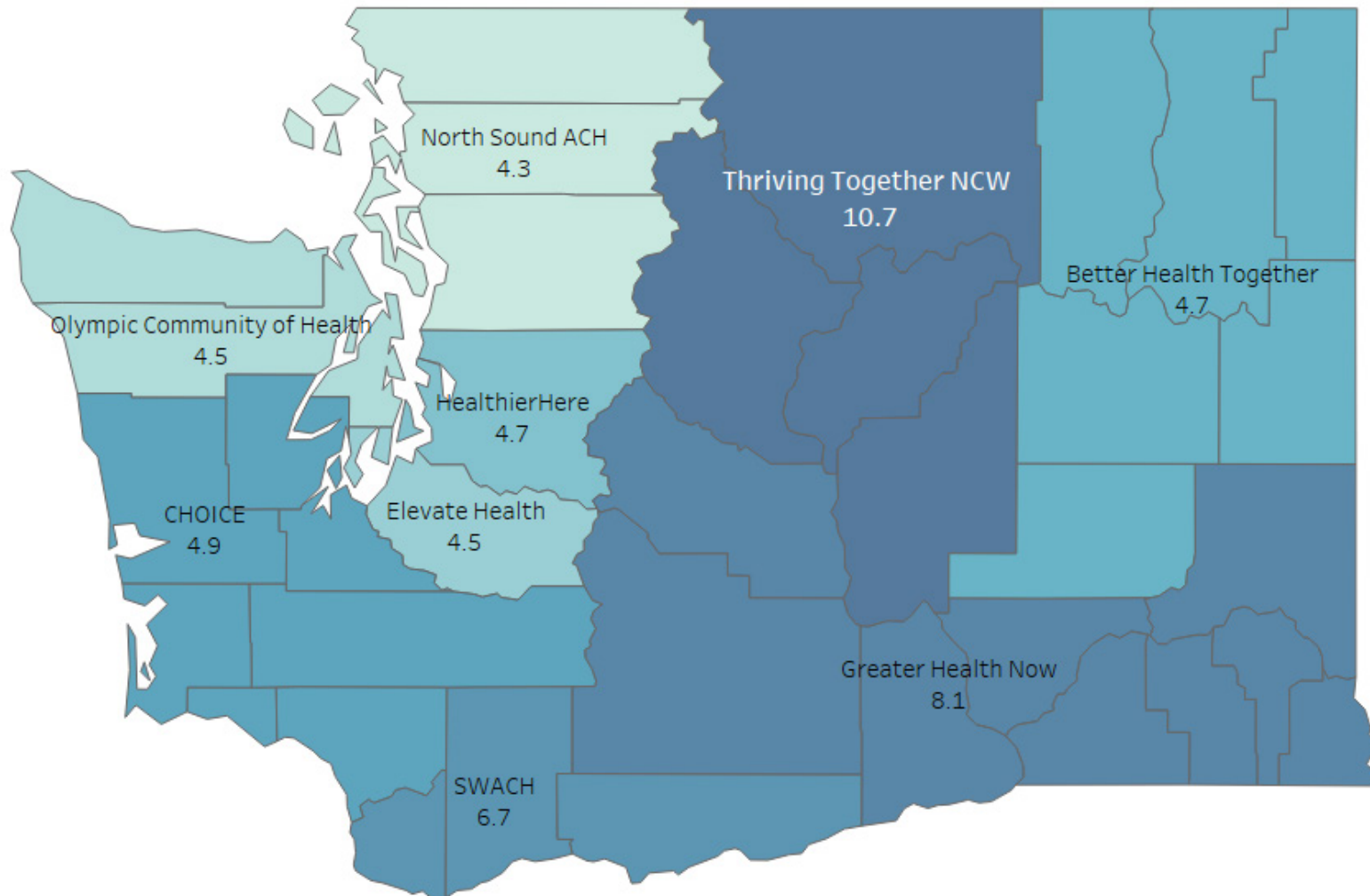
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Figure 5 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2019



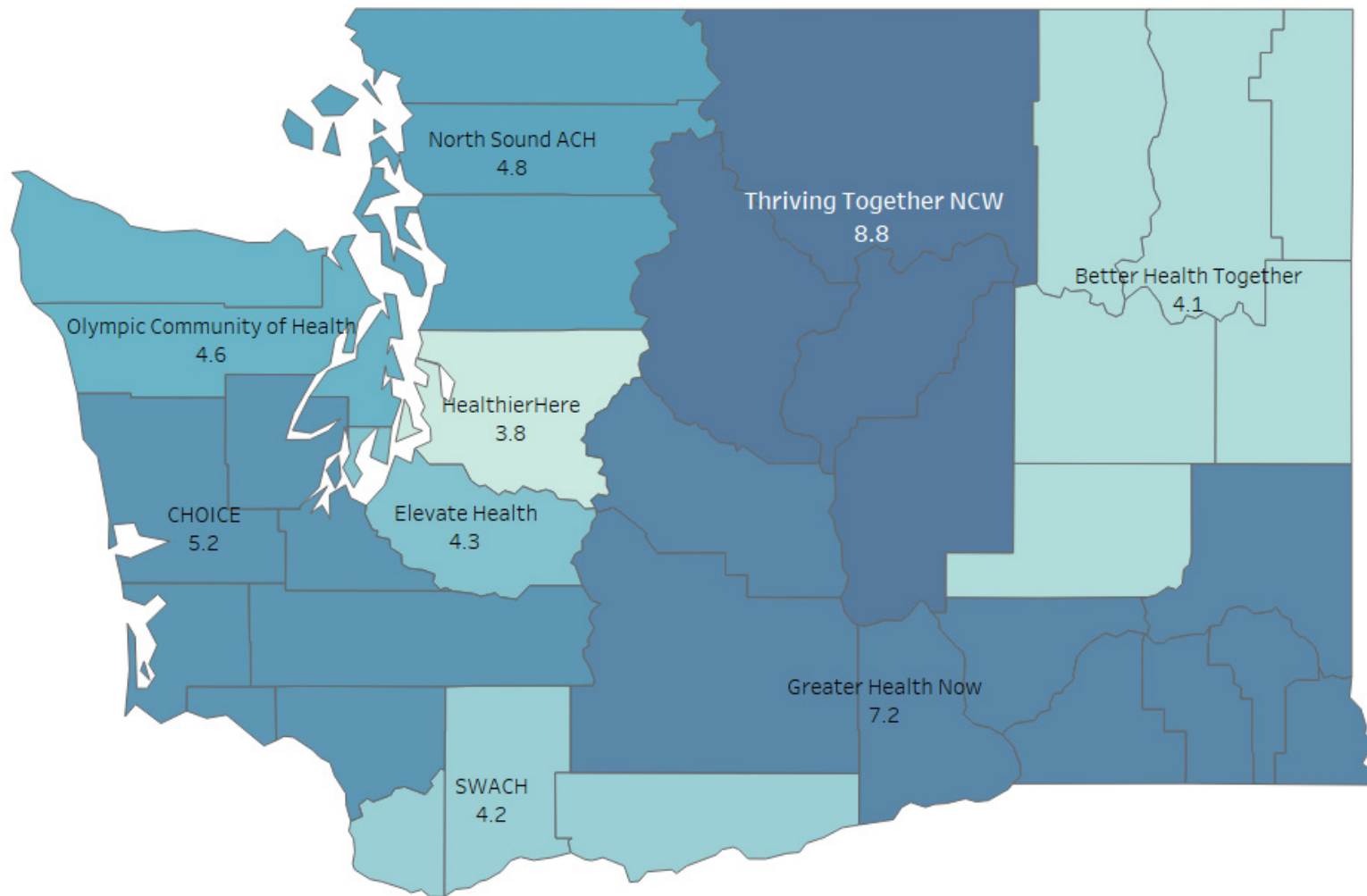
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Figure 6 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2021



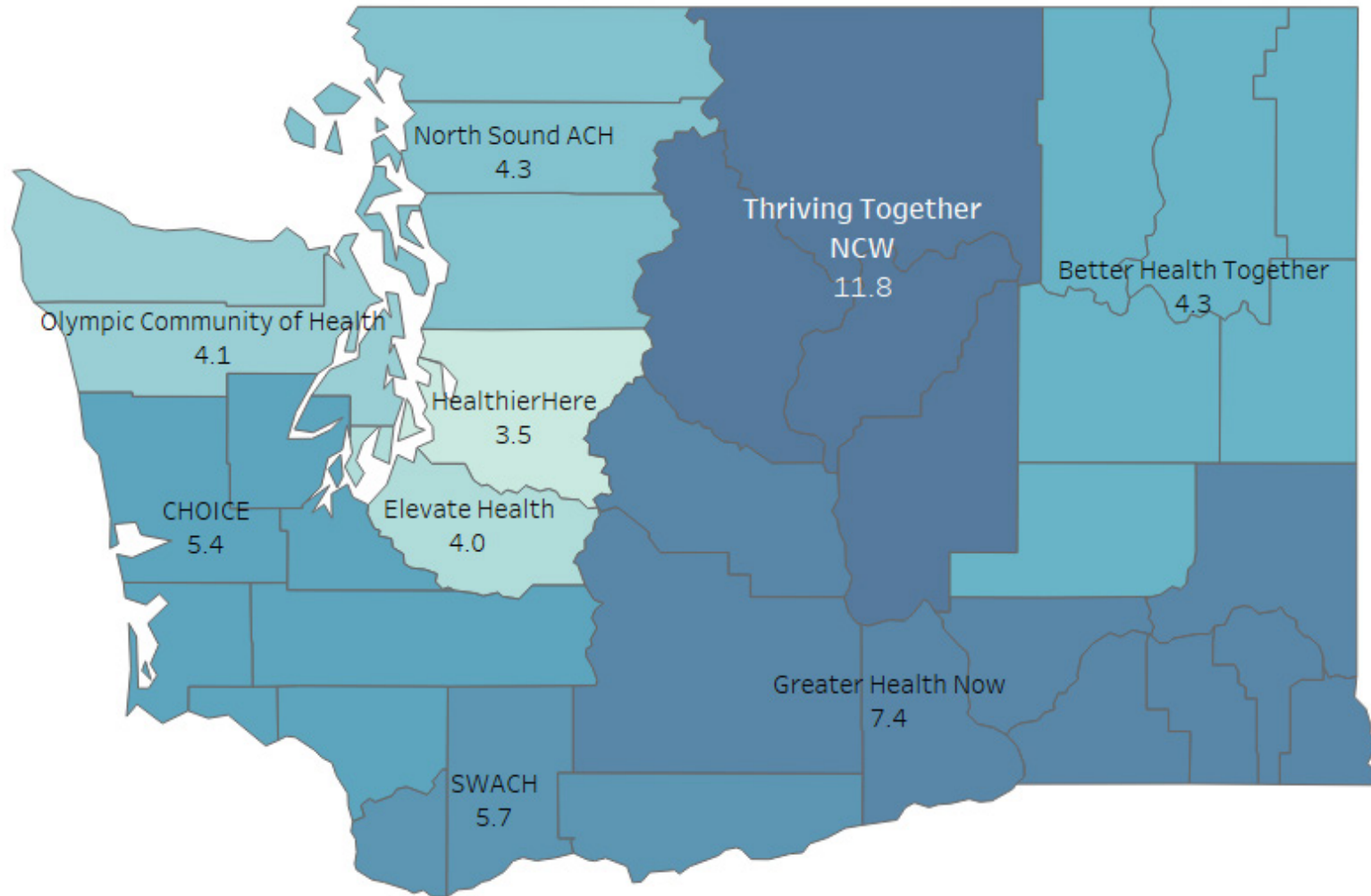
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Figure 7 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2022



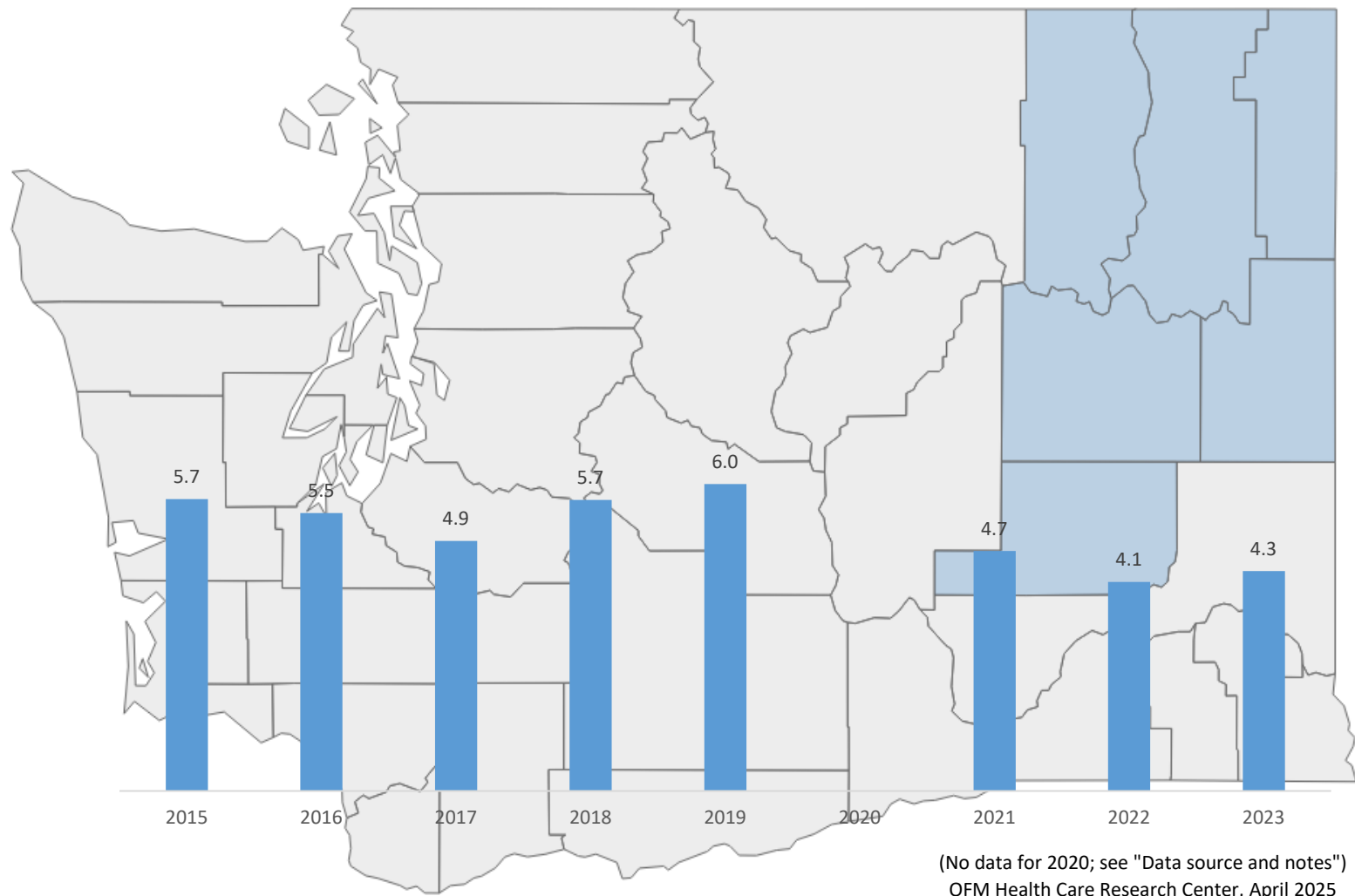
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Figure 8 - Uninsured Rates (%) for Accountable Communities of Health: Washington, 2023



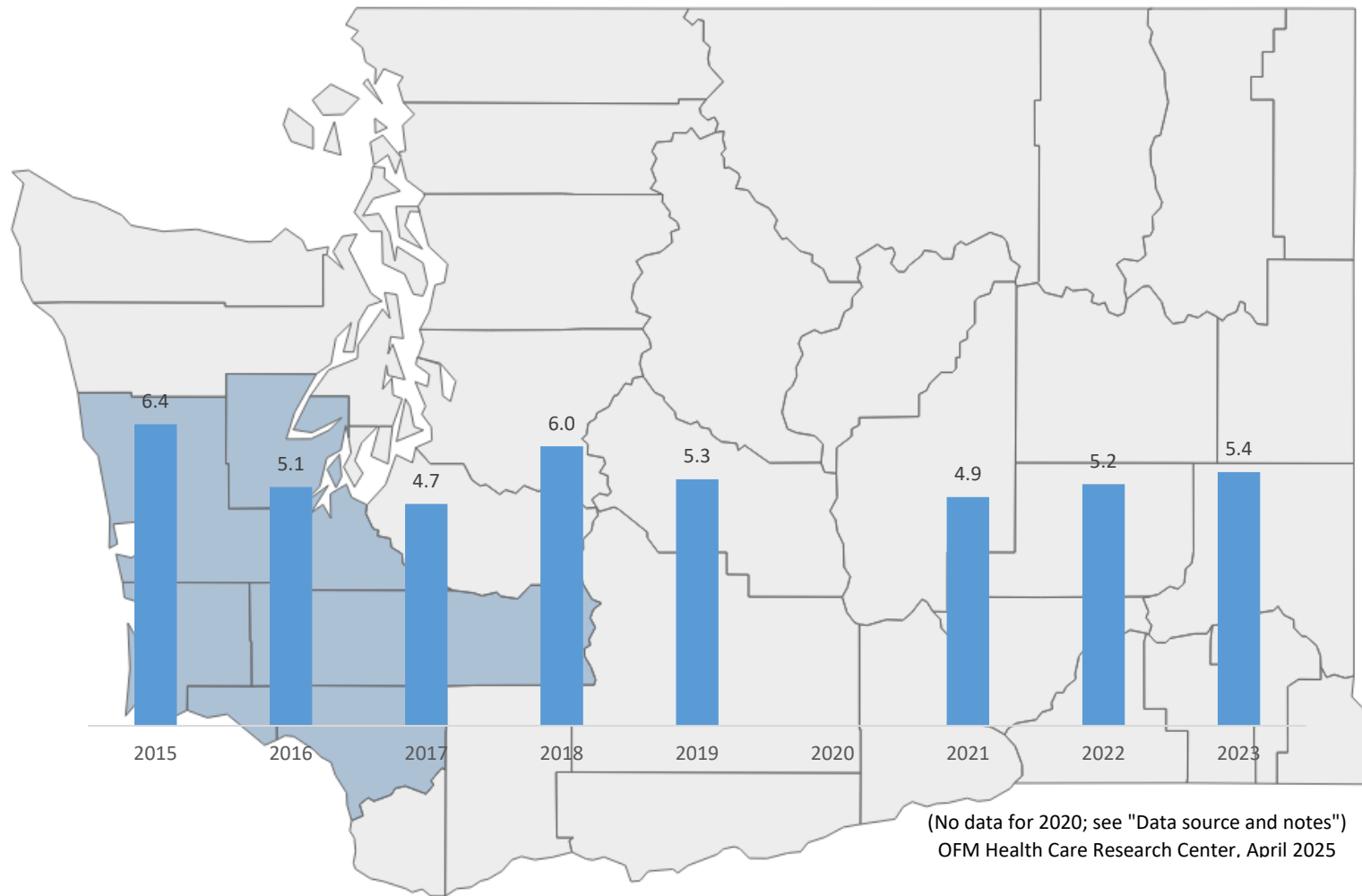
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Figure 9 - Percent Uninsured, Better Health Together, 2015–19 and 2021–23



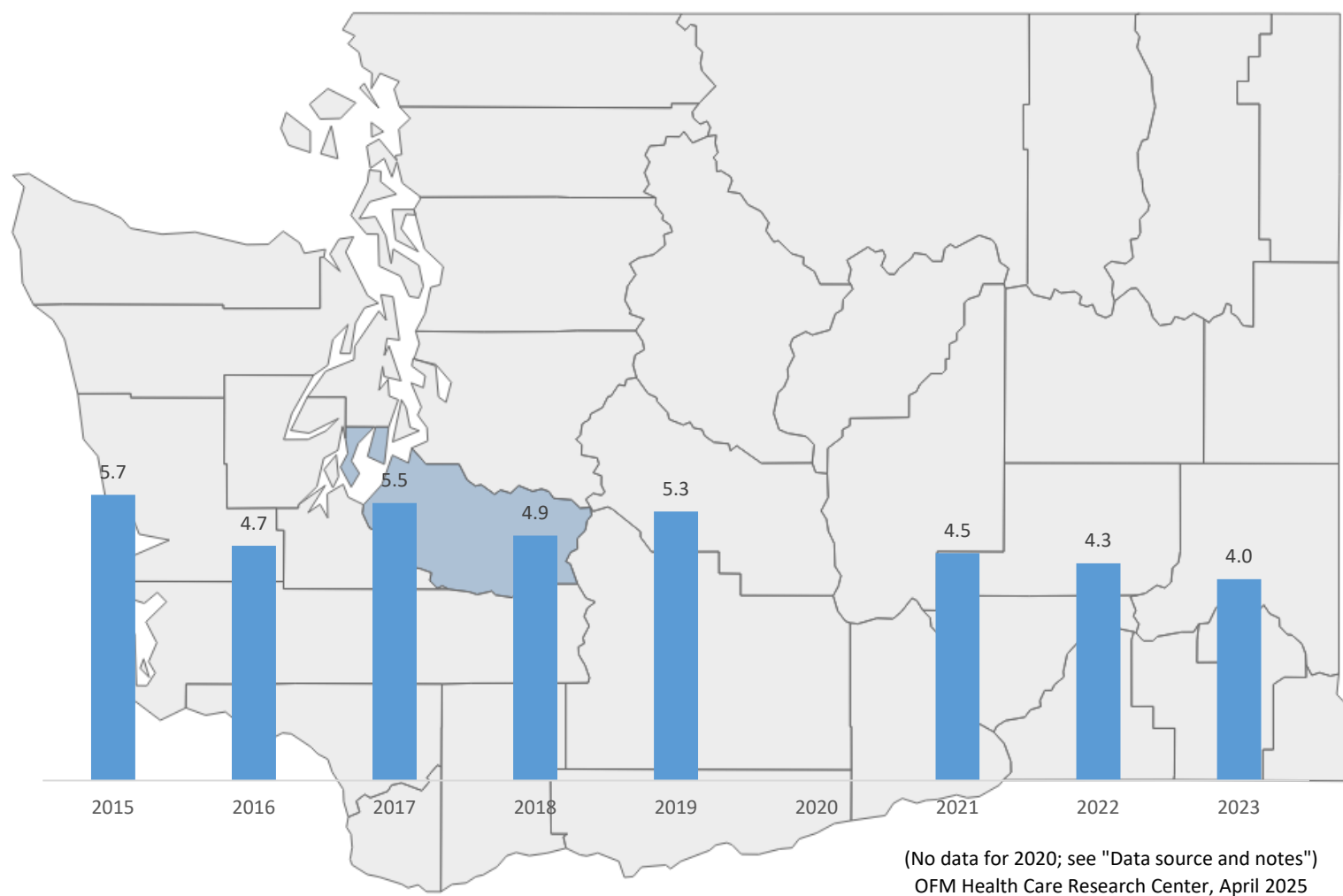
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Figure 10 - Percent Uninsured, CHOICE, 2015–19 and 2021–23

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Figure 12 - Percent Uninsured, Greater Health Now, 2015–19 and 2021–23

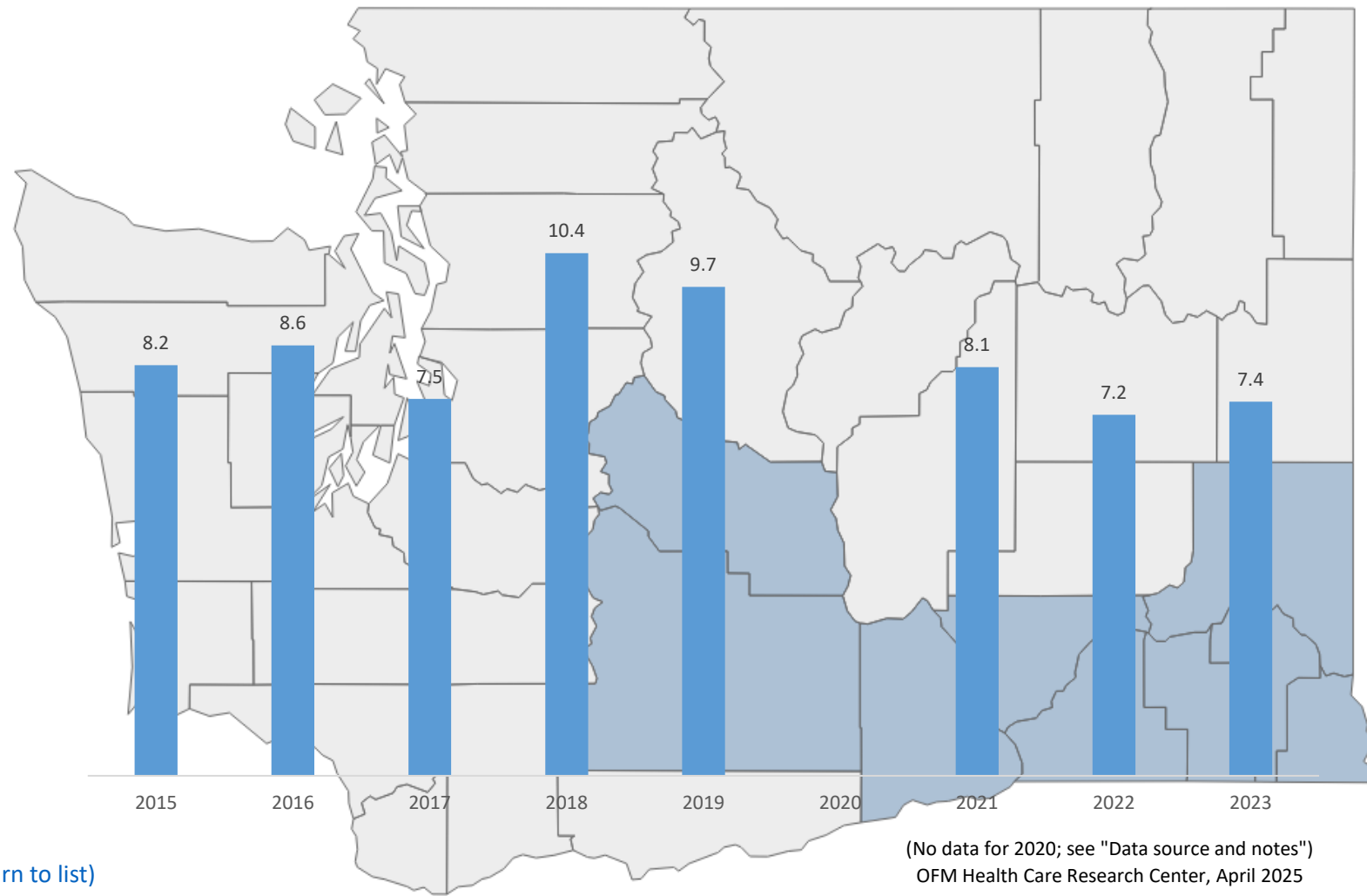
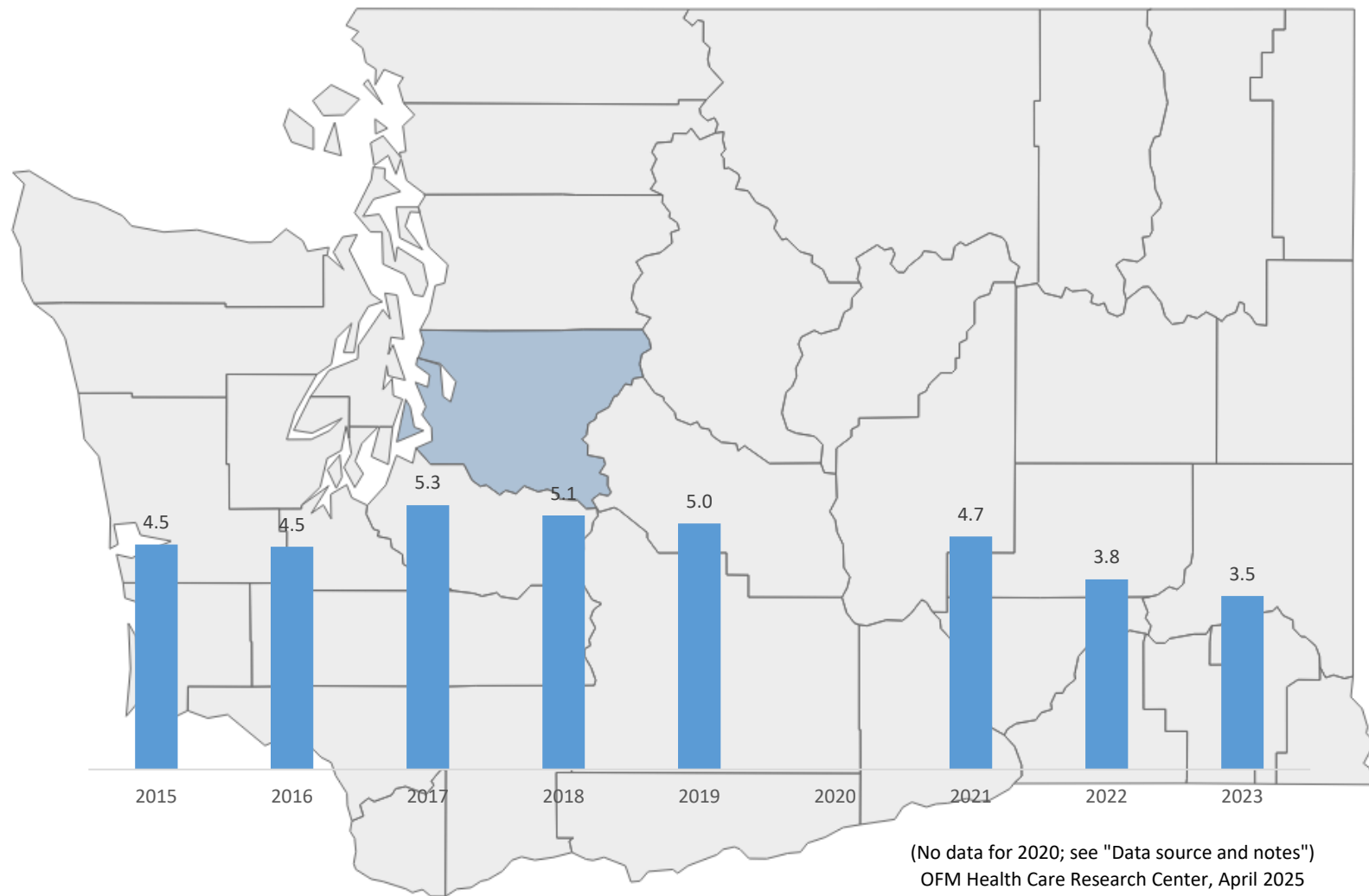
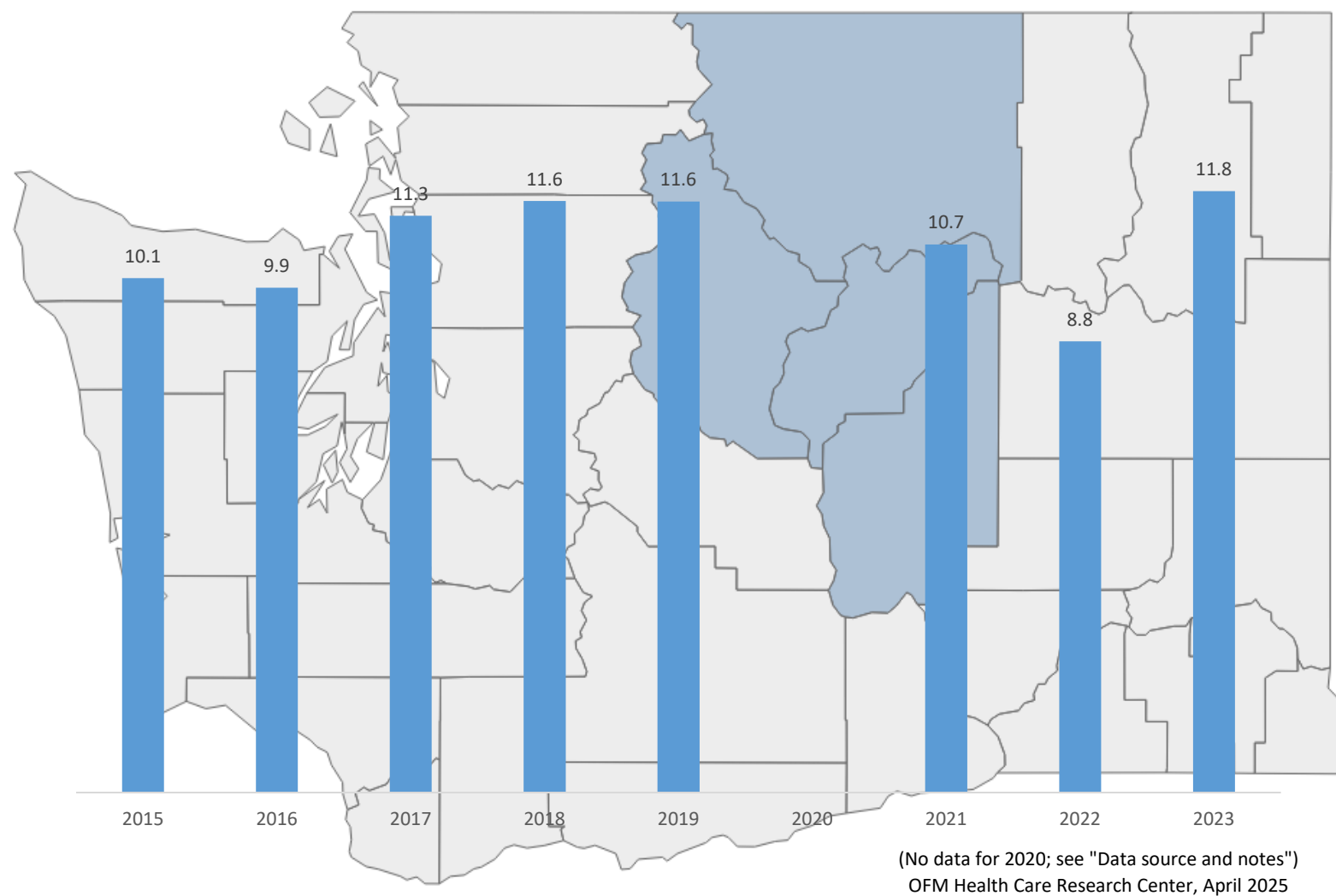


Figure 13 - Percent Uninsured, HealthierHere, 2015–19 and 2021–23



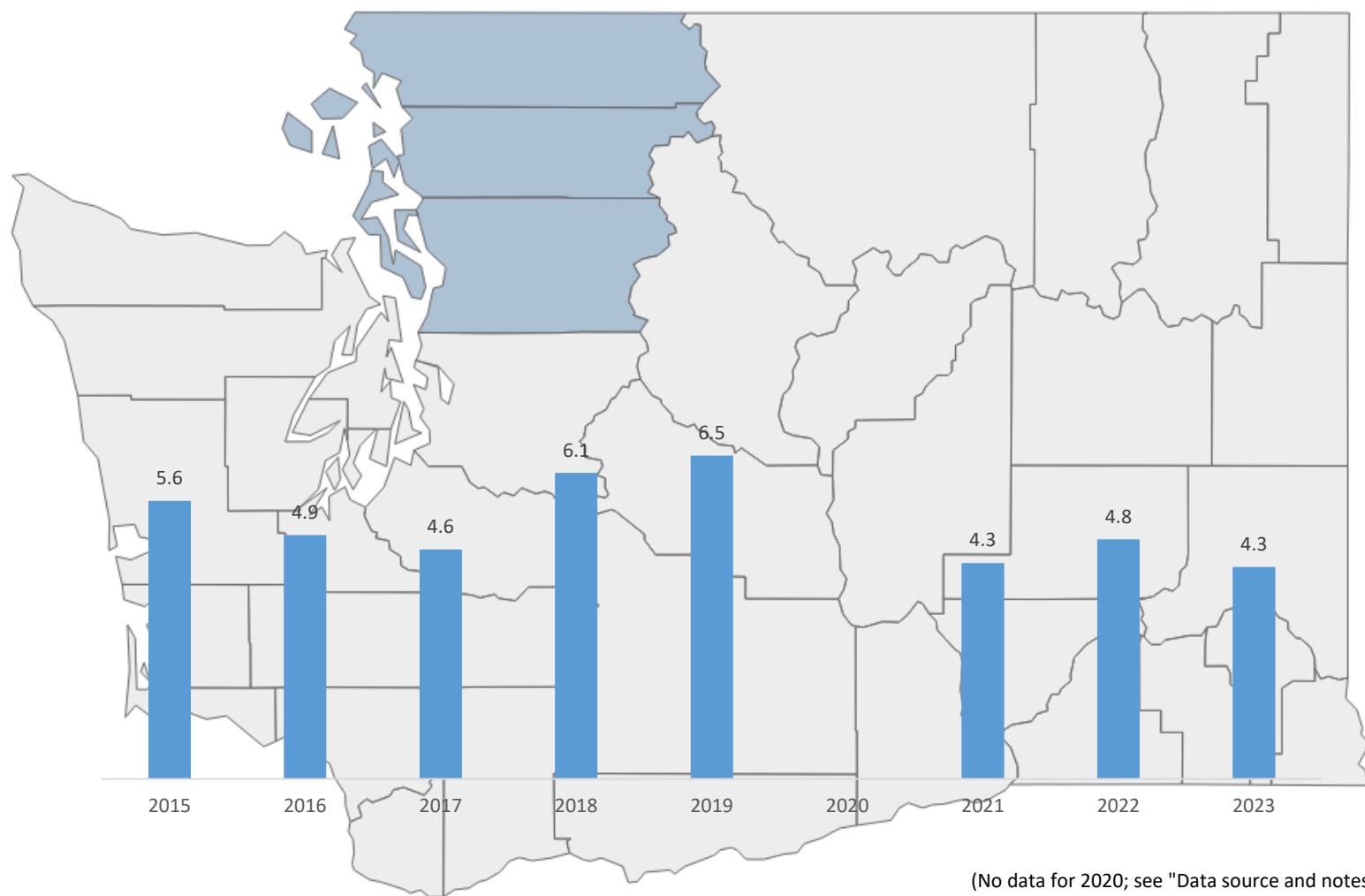
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Figure 14 - Percent Uninsured, Thriving Together NCW, 2015–19 and 2021–23



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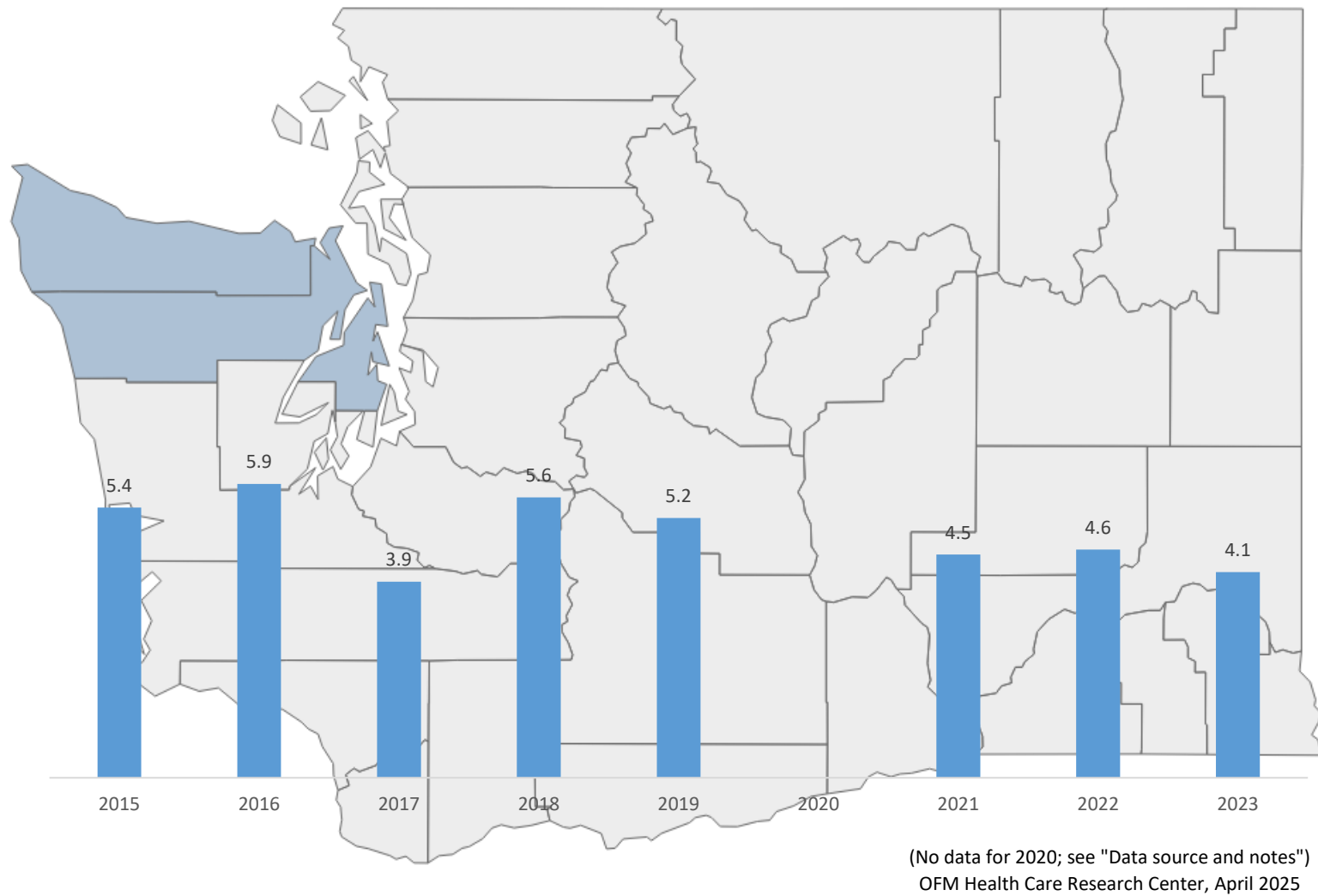
Figure 15 - Percent Uninsured, North Sound ACH, 2015–19 and 2021–23

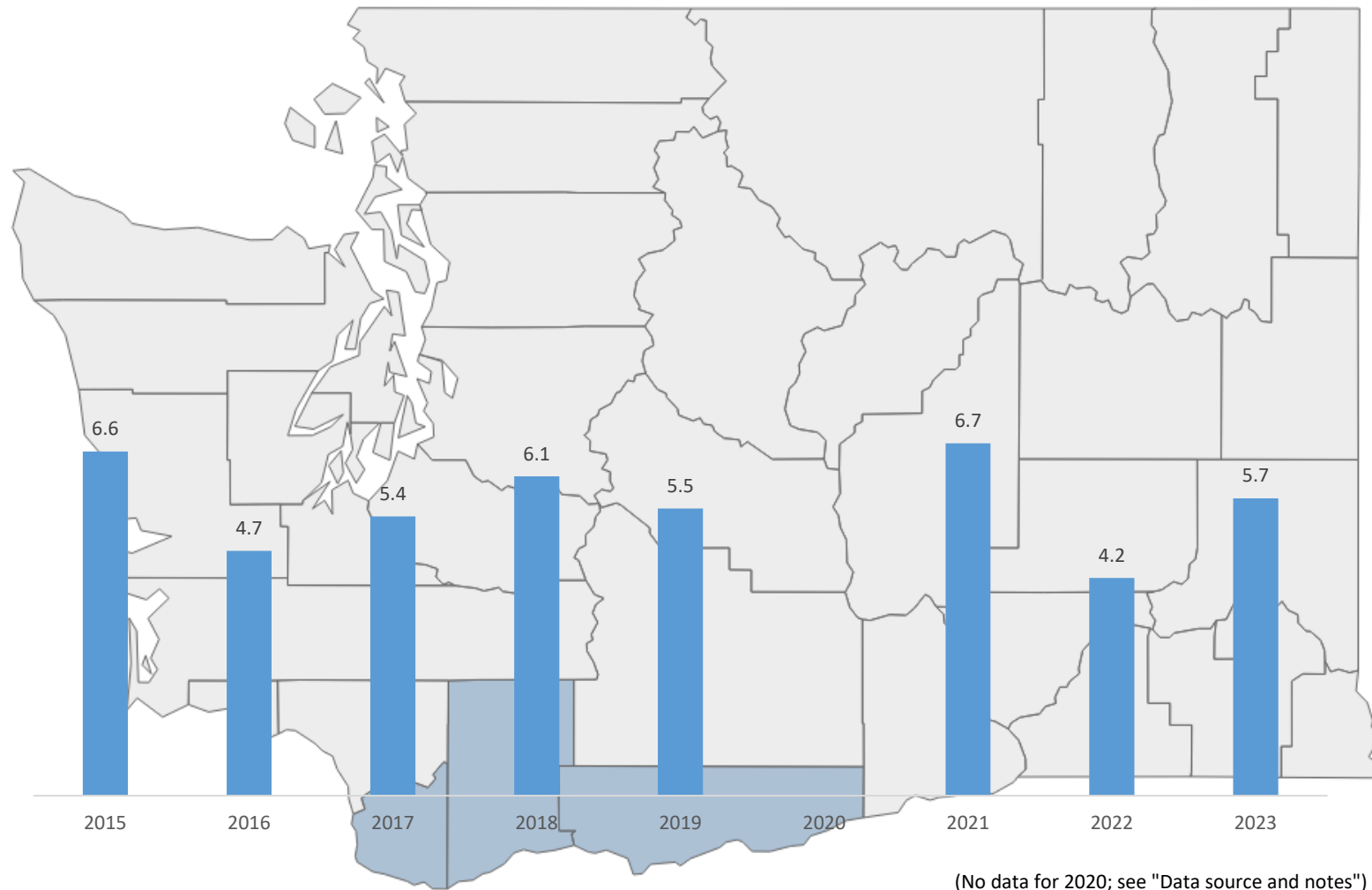
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Figure 16 - Percent Uninsured, Olympic Community of Health, 2015–19 and 2021–23

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Data source and notes

The data source we used for this report is the American Community Survey (ACS) 1-year Public Use Microdata Sample (PUMS) file for 2015 to 2019 and 2021–23. Data for 2020 are not reported because of the 2020 ACS data quality issues.¹ While working with ACS data, OFM analysts uncovered a significant undercount of Medicaid enrollment in Washington starting in 2014, the year the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) first rolled out the Medicaid expansion program. We decided to adjust for the Medicaid undercount using administrative data from the Medicaid program.² We calculated estimates in this document using the adjusted ACS for 2015 to 2019 and 2021 to 2023.

This report also used the new methodology first applied in 2020 (for the report on county uninsured estimates in 2012 to 2018). Before the 2020 report, we generated estimates for uninsured at the county level using the OFM County Population Estimate Model (CPEM). The CPEM is a synthesized data system that contains population counts of select population categories at the county level. The CPEM is constructed using the ACS 1-year PUMS and various OFM population projections.

We used the geography data field of Public Use Microdata Area (PUMA) in the ACS to allocate ACS distributions of health coverage and a few other population categories into counties in the CPEM system. Most of the PUMAs in the ACS correspond to a single county. For PUMAs that include more than one county, we performed the split of the PUMA estimates into the related counties using OFM population share estimates for the related counties.

The current methodology uses the same PUMA-county crosswalk in assigning counties to micro-records in ACS files. For records with PUMAs that each involve more than one county, we used a proportionate random imputation in the county assignment. In this case, county proportions of a PUMA are determined by OFM estimates for county population of select population categories. The output of the current methodology consists of the original ACS with the adjustment for undercount of Medicaid enrollment and the addition of the data field for county (which is used to group counties into Accountable Communities of Health). We compiled all estimates for 2015 to 2019 and 2021 to 2023 in this report using the current methodology.
