As an immigrant born and raised in the Philippines, moving to the United States as a teenager was an experience full of both challenges and new opportunities. My mother struggled to come to the U.S. to provide a better life for my family and me, from holding a tourist visa to an expired visa, to becoming undocumented, to sponsorship, and then, finally, to citizenship. I may share similar immigrant stories with some of you. But even the immigrant experience is itself varied and diverse.

My personal and professional goal is to push for us to continue to advocate for laws and policies that protect human rights, support immigrant communities, foster empathy, and build a more inclusive society. This year, we did this by sharing stories of immigrants and refugees. I took on the role of the Chair for the Washington Immigrant Network for the fiscal year 2021-2022 with the support of my agency, the Department of Enterprise Services, and my leaders, Trisha Cronin, Pat Seigler, Wendy Endress, Cindy Guertin-Anderson, and our Director, Tara Smith, and my Leadership Development Team. A shout out to my mentor, Kendrick Stewart, Deputy Director at the Department of Commerce.

I worked in partnership with a fantastic team of 18 state employees who also volunteered their time to help expand opportunities for immigrants who are current and future employees within the Washington state government. The Team also helped provide resources for all immigrants who are state employees to connect, share, and educate each other and Washington state agencies on the skills, expertise, and cultural value of a diverse workforce.

Thank you, our executive sponsor, Lorraine Lee, for supporting our efforts throughout the year! Special thanks to Julie Campos for stepping into the Vice-Chair role in the year's second half and being our secretary for the first part of the year. I also want to thank our members, allies, other BRGs, and partner agencies for supporting Washington Immigrant Network this year. In 2021-2022, Washington Immigrant Network held ten (10) monthly meetings from July 2021 to June 2022. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Washington Immigrant Network met online via Zoom or Microsoft Teams for all of its meetings. Meetings typically lasted an hour on the first Tuesdays of the month.

Washington Immigrant Network has an email circulation list of over 2,500 contacts participating in WIN meetings. Of this, approximately 40 to 50 members regularly attend monthly meetings consistently. From July 2021 to June 2022, we held virtual meetings.

Introduction

History

The Washington Immigrant Network (WIN) started as an initiative by Lorraine Lee, Chief Administrative Law Judge of the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH), which serves as the sponsoring agency. Judge Lee convened meetings to organize WIN in early 2017, inviting state workers interested in forming a Business Resource Group (BRG) for immigrant state workers. WIN officially began on June 8, 2018, with a kickoff event at the Governor's Residence. For the inaugural year, Christine Stalie served as Chair, Nam Nguyen served as co-chair, and Kim Sauer served as secretary.

Purpose

WIN is a Business Resource Group for Washington State's employees, the fourth such BRG, with a mission to:

- Expand opportunities for immigrants who are current and future employees within the Washington state government.
- Serve as a resource for all immigrants who are state employees to connect, share, and educate each other and Washington state agencies on the skills, expertise, and cultural value of a diverse workforce.

WIN's general goals are to:

- Retain and support immigrant state employees by providing a support structure, education, career progression, and leadership development assistance.

- Recruit immigrants to state service through outreach and educational activities.
- Serve as a resource for the Office of Financial Management (OFM) State Human Resources and state agencies in creating and sustaining a diverse and inclusive workforce an immigrant here is defined as a person born in a foreign country or a person who has a foreign-born parent.

Subcommittee Highlights


Professional Development

Over the last year, WIN's Professional Development Subcommittee hosted five (5) Public Speaking Sessions for the members. The events were created to provide a safe space for immigrant state employees and allies to practice public speaking and gather feedback from the committee chairs.

Membership Outreach

The committee hosted a Resume Workshop and Roundtable Discussion in October. They also worked on preparing the general FAQs for immigrants and state H.R. professionals who might help to check out some options with state jobs. In collaboration with the Career Development subcommittee team, the committee also presented tips on preparing resumes, cover letters, interviewing skills, and applying for state jobs. The committee members contacted various state agencies' diversity, equity, and inclusion teams to inform them about this resource.

General Membership Meetings



Special Projects




Annual Celebration



"You Belong"

The WIN BRG recently released a video the group produced to raise awareness about the state as an employer of choice for immigrant communities. The video was created in response to a request from the Governor's Office in Fall 2021.

After receiving the request, WIN Chair Joanne Lee and her Project Co-Lead, Mustafa Mohamedali, Department of Transportation, recruited and interviewed participants from several agencies. After the holidays, they launched a kickoff meeting with the group in January 2022. They filmed for several months and launched the screening in early May. After the final draft, WIN released the video to the public on Friday, June 17, 2022, at WIN's Annual Celebration event.

The video showcases the diversity of the state workforce and promotes Washington as a welcoming environment where immigrants can feel valued and appreciated – and where they can belong. It features several current state immigrant employees' stories that illustrate their experience with recruitment, applying for state jobs, being hired, and onboarding.


