

Who is teleworking because of the coronavirus?


Beginning in May 2020, the Bureau of Labor Statistics added questions to the Current Population Survey (the monthly household survey) to help gauge the effects of the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic on employment and unemployment. The following is a look at the survey results relative to those in the US able to telework.




Over one-third of all workers teleworked due to the coronavirus in May. In October the ratio was still over onein-five. That represents almost 32 million workers



The share of women teleworking due to the coronavirus has been greater than the share of men. This is likely because many maledominated activities can't be done off site.



Asian-Americans have the greatest share of teleworking due to the coronavirus. This is likely a result of the high share of Asian-Americans in the technology sectors.



Workers with advanced degrees have the highest incidence of teleworking.
Apparently those working in the realm of ideas tend not to be constrained by locale.
